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## PEACE OUTLOOK MORE HOPEFUL

### Morocco Situation Not So Warlike and Prospects of Agreement Good.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

BERLIN, Germany, July 29.—It is believed in official circles that France and Germany may be able to untie the African knot by direct negotiations and without opening the doors to the participation of Great Britain and other powers. Rosy optimism, however, was not manifested yesterday. Chancellor Von Bethmann Hollweg and probably Foreign Secretary Baron Von Kiderlin Wachtel left yesterday to join Emperor William who will arrive at Swinemunde from his cruise in northern waters. Definite predictions would be misplaced until after this meeting. The Foreign Office was fully prepared for Premier Asquith's statement and now confirms that it had earlier assurances that Great Britain would not intervene so long as Germany and France were trying to settle the matter directly and also that Chancellor Lloyd George's speech was not meant as veto of a Franco-German agreement on the basis of a French Congo understanding as a section of the British press had intimated.

LOOKS BRIGHTER. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

PARIS, July 29.—Confidence that France and Germany will be able to reach a pacific solution of their difficulty in Morocco increases daily. It is understood that negotiations for the present are concerned with fixing what part of the French Congo France is willing to cede in return for German disinterestedness in Morocco and possibly that cession by Germany of a whole or part of Togo land, the German colonial possession on the Gulf of Guinea, between the Gold Coast Colony and Dahomey.

The Situation in England. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

LONDON, England, July 29.—The Moroccan simoon seemed less sultry today and it is generally conceded that Premier Asquith's statement had helped to clear the air and to some extent ease the tension. It is the hope of the British government that the Algeiras act has not been shown to be mere diplomatic patchwork and that some more lasting settlement will be effected which will tranquilize the European situa-

tion as well as the Moroccan difficulty.

Asquith's announcement that Great Britain has not the least disposition to obstruct a Franco-German agreement in West Africa, it is hoped by officials here, will dissipate the German belief that the British government is pursuing a policy of endeavor to thwart Germany's desire for territorial expansion. It is considered a hopeful sign that King George is making definite arrangements to attend the Cowes regatta while members of the Cabinet are preparing to leave town for the week end.

### URGE TAFT VETO.

Stand Pat Republicans Want President to Protect Wool Tariff. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 29.—President Taft is being urged by several standpat republicans leaders of the Senate and House to veto any wool revision bill that is likely to be agreed upon in the forthcoming conference in the House and the LaFollette compromise wool measure.

### COMMUNITES SENTENCE.

Oklahoma's Governor at Last Moment Spares Negro's Life. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 29.—As Sheriff Spain stood in the cell of John H. Pather here today preparing him for execution, an order was received from Governor Bruce commuting Pather's sentence to life imprisonment. Pather was one of four negroes charged with the murder of P. M. Archer while robbing him.
