COUNCIL WILL MEET TONIGHT

Expect That Both Water and Waterfront Railway Franchises Will Come Up.

The regular meeting of the Marshfield city council tonight promises to be enlivened by discussions over the water franchise and the street car or waterfront railway franchise besides a number of other matters.

The return of Mr. Nolan who has been negotiating for the local waterworks system and for the new fifty-year water franchise is expected to be for the purpose of personally trying to get the council to consider his application which has been generally regarded as unreasonable. No official statement has been given out by Mr. Nolan regarding his plans.

It was rumored today that Francis H. Clarke, head of the Coos Bay and Boise Railway project, would ask for a waterfront railway franchise similar to the one sought by the other local men. This could not be confirmed. F. A. Haines, chief engineer of the company, said that he doubted the report as he had not been apprised of any such intention.

Advocates of the municipally owned and controlled waterfront line are also taking a lively interest in the matter.

FATE OF TIDE FLATS PENDS

Demurrer in Important Suit Is Overruled—Barbour Case Up Again.

Judge J. S. Coke of the Circuit Court has just overruled a demurrer filed in the interests of Jane A. Chadwick and Patrick Hennessey in the case of the Port of Coos Bay to determine on what basis the commissioners may exercise full power over the tidelands, the area between full tide and low tide marks. The demurrer was on a technicality and the decision upon that point now leaves the case ready to be heard on the main point. This will be at an early date, probably.

The suit was originally started as a test case by the Port Commission to determine on what basis they could obtain the tide flats, contending that the tide-flats having always been navigable for a certain portion of the time at least could not be closed against public use any more than other highway by private owners. Patrick Hennessey was made the defendant in the original test suit but later J. W. Bennett intervened in behalf of Jane A. Chadwick.

The points involved are new in Oregon and it will be a law-making decision besides its great importance to Coos Bay, involving as it does the great area of tide flats.
