Henderson is also ready for the big go and is confident that he will give "Roughhouse" the go of his life. Henderson's friends are likewise confident of his ability to put it over on the San Francisco boxer.

A great deal of interest is being shown by the local followers of the "squared circle" and Promoter John Herron is confident he will have the best card that was ever put on in this section.

The preliminary between Billy Wilson and Bill Gaffney, which is slated to go ten rounds, also promises to be a bout of more than the ordinary merit. Both lads are clever with the gloves and are training hard for the go.
