Council Tonight.—The Marshfield city council will meet this evening to take up the Front street Railway franchise and also the water franchise matter.

Grimes to Return.—Dorsey Kreitzer today received a telegram from Wm. Grimes, who with Mrs. Grimes has been spending the summer with relatives in Ohio and the east, that he will return here about September 1.

Telegraph Wire Down.—The Western Union's telegraph wire went out of commission about noon today and service had not been restored at a late hour. The trouble was supposed to be someplace near Sumner.

Release Marsden.—It is understood that Robert Marsden Sr., and Robert Marsden Jr., have arranged to furnish \$1,000 bail for Jack Marsden who has been confined in the county jail at Coquille since his assault on J. W. Bennett, pending the action of the grand jury.

Three Confirmed.—Three were confirmed at the Marshfield Episcopal church Sunday by Bishop Scadding of Portland who conducted the services. They were Alec Campbell and wife and Miss Florence Aiken. The services were largely attended, many friends of Bishop Scadding who belong to other denominations attending.

Names Falkenstein.—Congressman Hawley has recommended the appointment of L. F. Falkenstein of North Bend as shipping commissioner for the Port of Coos Bay. This is a new federal position as far as this port is concerned. The shipping commissioner is the official representative of the government and his duties are to act as a "go-between" in case of disputes or other troubles between ship owners and the sailors.

Undergoes Operation.—A. A. Nichols and family passed through the city today on their way to Empire where they will remain during the absence of Mr. Nichols' sister who is in Lane hospital, San Francisco, where she underwent an operation last Tuesday for tumor. Mr. McMullen and Mrs. McMullen's sister, Mrs. Georgina Rozell accompanied her to San Francisco. A letter received yesterday from them stated that while Mrs. McMullen was very low she was improving and hopes are entertained of her ultimate recovery.

To Connect Lakes.—Henry Sengstacken has returned from Ten Mile where he was investigating the Port commission's project for cutting a channel between the lakes. He consulted the people there and hopes to start the work this fall which will eliminate the overland haul of bulk and products between the boat lines on the two lakes. He reports everything is prosperous in that section, the fine new two story building which Milo Pierson recently completed at Ten Mile adding to the appearance of that place.

To Aid Boston.—Donald M. Charleston of the United States Engineering Department came over from Coquille today to assist Engineer Robinson of the Port of Coos Bay in placing some special aids to navigation for the benefit of the cruiser Boston on her arrival here. The matter was arranged by Engineer Leefe who took the matter with the Portland office and through them with the United States Lighthouse Department, which now has charge of such matters. The lighthouse tender Heather is to be sent in here soon for the purpose of placing buoys and other aids to navigation.

SEEK EDITOR ON REALTY FRAUD

Grant Lincoln, Who Tried to Promote Marshfield Paper, Is Now Sought.

Grant Lincoln of Klamath Falls, who was recently on Coos Bay for the purpose of promoting and starting a new daily paper in Marshfield is in more serious trouble than he left Coos Bay for. While a few here are said to hold worthless checks issued by Lincoln, it is understood that no charges have been filed against him. The following dispatch from Klamath Falls tells of his latest predicament:

"Word has been received that Grant Lincoln, first editor of the Klamath Chronicle, is wanted by the authorities at San Diego. It is alleged that Lincoln obtained money under false pretenses from Fred Clift and wife, former residents of this city. In trading some Klamath Falls property for San Diego realty and representing to the Clifts that his property was free from all incumbrances. Later it developed that everything he had transferred to the Clifts was heavily mortgaged. It is charged.

"Lincoln is well known in this city. At the time the Klamath Publishing company was incorporated and the daily Chronicle placed in the newspaper world, Lincoln was chosen as its editor. Word was recently received from Coos county that he had written checks there on banks where he had no funds. Shortly before leaving this city Lincoln wrote checks at various times when he had no funds. In this city there are many who had business dealings with him."

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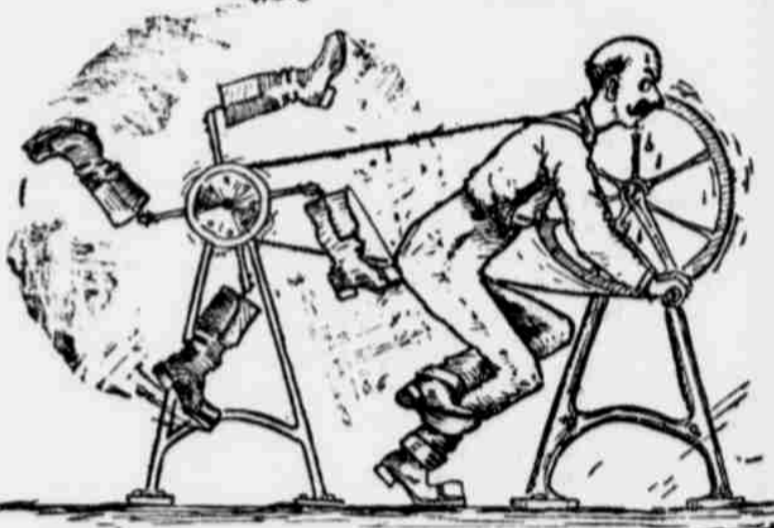
