## FINE RECORD OF HENDERSON

Henderson's record shows the following:

- July 3, 1909—Knocked out Sid Tarry at Muscatine.
- Sept. 25, 1910—Got decision in stopped fight with Sid Brown at Muscatine in seventh round.
- October 2, 1910—Knocked out Sid Brown at Eau Claire, Wis., in eighth round.
- December, 1910—Knocked out Darby O'Brien of Kansas City, in Oklahoma in 12th round.
- Feb. 21, 1911—Lost to Kid Firmo, 155-lbs, after 15 rounds.
- June 1, 1911—Won in seventh round from Chas. Sefton at Tulsa, Okla.
- June 12, 1911—Won from Dale Gardner at Oakland, Cal., in 5th round.

## OBRIEN TO VISIT COOS BAY SOON

Roseburg boasts of two per cent maximum grade. The Asset company's maximum grade is 1.65 per cent and this can be reduced to a one per cent maximum by a heavier roadbed and with more grading."

### O'BRIEN'S WORD AT STAKE.

Eugene View of Roseburg's Doubt of Announcement.

The Eugene Guard says: "Authentic rumors have come from Roseburg, in fact, indirectly from the president of the Commercial club, that he and other residents of that city have money to bet at odds of 5 to 1 that the railroad to Coos Bay will never be built from Eugene. They are making these offers on the fact that they claim the Southern Pacific company can reach Coos Bay with a road only 65 miles long, while it will take 125 miles of line from Eugene. They also claim that a road can be built from that city without a tunnel and with nothing greater than a two per cent grade. Prominent railroad men, expressing their own opinions, however, seem to believe that the odds are in favor of Eugene, and it is the general opinion that since the official announcement has been made by General Manager O'Brien, he will never allow his word to be jeopardized."

had told him to go ahead with the municipal plan and that when it reached the right stage they would either submit a proposition to sell or would consider an offer for it.

This latter statement was in response to a statement by A. H. Powers that he had been given to understand that Mr. Nolan had already closed the deal for the present company. Mr. Powers said that he did not know for sure that this had been done but in case it was, he wondered about the city's ability to take the property over.

Other members of the council said that Mr. Nolan had given them to understand that he would not buy the plant unless given the new fifty-year franchise.

### Offers From Engineers.

Edgar McDaniel, who had written various engineering firms for terms for expediting the Coos Bay water situation, read replies from several. Two firms, Louis C. Kelsey and Stannard & Richardson of Portland had representatives present. Mr. Reese and Mr. Richardson, respectively. Stannard & Richardson's terms of \$10 per day with the city to pay all other expenses were the lowest. Mr. Reese's offer was for to do the entire work for \$2,000, same to be deducted from the four per cent commission his firm was to receive in case a municipal plant was installed. Messrs. Richardson and Reese had several little tilts, being occasioned by Mr. Reese not submitting his terms until the others had been read. After more or less discussion Stannard & Richardson's terms were accepted, the committees agreeing to recommend them to the city councils tonight for ratification.

The firm selected is the same one that prepared a preliminary report on the North Bend water situation last winter. In that estimate, they figured that the present plant could be put in first class shape and adequate for the present demands at an expense of about \$50,000, their estimate being:

- Mains . . . . . \$14,000
- Filtration . . . . . \$12,000
- Connections . . . . . \$6,000
- Reservoirs . . . . . \$18,000

Total . . . . . \$50,000

This included improvements for both North Bend and Marshfield with a special reservoir at North Bend. Mr. Richardson stated that he ex-

pected to be able to start in within a short time on the work and the committees hope to get it completed so that it can be submitted at the regular election in December.

On request of Councilman Powers, Mayor Simpson of North Bend agreed that the Simpson Lumber company would give Councilman Albrecht a leave of absence so that he could assist the new engineers in going over the project.

The matter will be taken up at tonight's council meeting.

000,000 let him contract to build our road from Eugene. I am sure that the directors would gladly approve a contract with a responsible company for that figure without going to further trouble with surveys," said a railroad official yesterday.

"Coos Bay trade has gone to San Francisco in large quantities in the past and they realized that the railroad will turn much of this to Portland. The volume in which Portland will gain from the opening of Coos Bay depends upon the proximity of the connection to the city. By succeeding in having the directors build out of Eugene, Mr. O'Brien has made it possible for Portland to gain the maximum amount of benefit from its \$8,000,000 expenditure.

"This has been accomplished, too without diminishing the good effects that the territory south of Eugene will experience. The road will pass through a promising part of Douglas county and the business that is developed there naturally will flow into Roseburg, the county seat."
