# WRITES ABOUT INSTRUCTIONS

## Wisconsin Supreme Court Judge Gives Views on Mc-Clallen Case.

O. O. Lund is in receipt of a letter from an old Wisconsin friend, Judge A. J. Vinje of the Wisconsin supreme court which will be of much interest on the Bay. When the recall of Judge Coke was being advocated by a few at Roseburg on account of the McClallen case, Mr. Lund sent Judge Vinje a copy of the instructions which were criticised by a few at Roseburg. In a personal letter to Mr. Lund, Judge Vinje says: "As a member of the Supreme Court of Wisconsin I feel that it would not be proper for me to express an opinion as to the legal correctness of the instructions sent me in the case of State vs. McClallen. I have read them carefully, however, and, assuming they are in accordance with the state law there is certainly nothing in them that can be tortured into bias for either side. On the other hand they appear to me to contain a clear and impartial statement of the law presumably called in question by the evidence in the case. The careful, prudent, trial judge who has in mind the rights of both the state and the accused will see to it that the instructions do not err in favor of the state for that means a new trial and additional expense in almost every case of conviction. In every criminal case the question of acquittal or conviction lies almost wholly with the jury. If they think there should be a conviction there will be one in spite of any instructions that may be given. If they want to acquit no instructions can secure a conviction. The arbiter of the fate of the accused is the jury, not the judge. If there be error in the instructions sent me, the error is purely one of judgment as to what the law applicable to the case is, and to invoke the recall for such an error means judicial and social anarchy. I have too much faith in the good sense of the people of Oregon to believe they will so abuse the power entrusted to them. Yours truly, A. J. VINJE."
