### SEELEY CALLS BOUT A DRAW

#### Crowd However Gives Hender- son Decision Over Burns Saturday Night.

Twenty rounds to a draw was the decision of Referee Tim Seeley in the bout between "Roughhouse Charley" Burns and Earl Henderson at the Marshfield Skating Rink Saturday night. It was one of the cleverest goes ever seen on the Bay and if the decision had been left to the audience, eight out of every ten present would have given the decision to Henderson, judging from the comments after the fight and expressions of the crowd when Referee Seeley announced his opinion.

With the exception of two or three rounds, Henderson outpointed Burns throughout the match. Henderson is a very clever boxer, has good footwork, very seldom hit wild, took advantage of nearly every opening and pressed the match throughout.

The match was under Marquis of Queensbury rules. At first Promoter Herron announced that the fighters were to break clean but "Roughhouse Charley" objected to this and insisted on "fighting all the time." Henderson acceded to this and although giving Burns his own style of fighting, he was able to do it. He simply went Burns one better at his own game. In fact Henderson's cleverness was so far superior to Burns' that he overshadowed "Roughhouse Charley" and caused Burns' supporters much disappointment at his showing.

Henderson was only lacking in one thing and that the kick. While he landed frequently on Burns, his blows lacked the steam to show any great effect.

Burns apparently only had two things in his favor and that is ability to stand punishment and to land in clinches. His ability to take punishment coupled with the style of fighting he has adopted leads him keep boring in all the time.

Neither of the men were severely punished and very little blood was shed. Henderson landed several to Burns' left eye and nose and caused the latter a little worry. Henderson was in the pink of condition and did not show as much fatigue at the close as did Burns.

Only in two rounds, the thirteenth and fourteenth, could Burns be said to have had any of the best of it. In those, he did considerably rushing and landed once or twice weakening Henderson's defense. Seldom during the bout did Burns land a clean one, most of his blows being to Henderson's stomach in the clinches.

Besides having it over Burns in cleverness, Henderson showed that he was the equal of Burns in strength and the latter's "Roughhouse" style availed him little in the clinches.

In the fifteenth, Henderson came back strong and throughout the last five rounds outpointed Burns as much as he had in the earlier rounds.

Billy Wilson of Marshfield and Walter Weaver of Coos City were the principals in the preliminary. Bill Gaffney of North Bend was to have met Wilson but it was announced that he had got "cold feet." Weaver was picked out of the crowd and while he showed lack of training, he gave Wilson all he wanted to do and the bout was declared a "draw" by Referee Bobbie Evans of Portland, who is to meet Roughhouse Charley Burns at Bandon the latter part of the month.
