

TILLAMOOK PLEASURES SKIPPED.

Coos Bay Built Schooner Is Good Carrier and Makes Fair Time.

Captain O. F. Antonsen, of the new gasoline schooner Tillamook, says that she is an excellent sea vessel, and in point of strength and general worthiness is what her appearance indicates, a counterpart of a steam schooner on a small scale.

The Tillamook has a length of 125 feet, beam of 28 1/2 feet and depth of hold of 11 feet. She will carry 400 tons dead-weight and has a draft light of six feet and of 11 feet loaded. It is expected that she will develop 10 1/2 knots, as she made an average of eight and a half knots on her trip from North Bend. She will not operate to the smaller coast ports, it being intended that the gasoline schooner Patsy, due to arrive in about two weeks, will run between Portland and harbors where the entrances are shoal. Captain Antonsen was formerly mate on the steamer Sue H. Elmore, under Captain Schraeder, and Frank Coulter, chief engineer of the Tillamook, was formerly on the Gerald C. The new vessel carries a crew of nine, and until she has been in service a short time no passengers will be transported.—Portland Oregonian.

AID BANDON ROAD.

As a result of the road meeting held with the county court at Coquille, that body has agreed to assist in building the road south from Bandon to the county line, and will duplicate all money raised by subscription on the proposition. The road includes a long bridge across China Creek and a large amount of grading that needs to be done.—Bandon Recorder.

When the matter was brought up for discussion last Tuesday night, all that it lacked to make it a law was the signature of the Mayor but for some reason he refused to sign it. In order to pass an ordinance over the Mayor's veto a majority vote of the five councilmen is required which is almost certain to transpire at their next meeting.—Coquille Sentinel.
