THE WEATHER.

OREGON, Aug. 17.—Fair to night and Friday.

Play Coquille.—The Marshfield baseball team is figuring on playing Coquille at Coquille next Sunday. The game has not been definitely arranged. If the team does not go to Coquille, they will probably play Sumner.

Eight Coming.—H. W. Painter this morning received a telegram from some old friends at Guthrie, Okla., stating that eight prominent Germans of that city were starting for Coos Bay with a view of investing and locating here.

Train Earlier.—The afternoon train for Portland now leaves Drain earlier and in consequence Capt. Edwards has had to advance the hour of departure on its auto line. Beginning next week, the hour of departure will be 5 o'clock instead of 5:30.

Initiate One.—Marshfield Lodge of Elks last evening initiated W. E. Best of North Bend and later enjoyed a little spread. The lodge is planning to incorporate as a result of purchasing the Geo Ayre property, the final details of which were concluded today.

To Open Cafe.—Fred Knudsen, proprietor of the Baltimore Lunch Stand on Front street, today leased a room in the Gow Why building on Broadway near Commercial and will open a second cafe. It will be remodeled and nicely fitted up and will soon open for business.

Gov. West Ill.—Gov. West's trip to Coos Bay had to be unexpectedly postponed on account of his suffering an attack of pleurisy. He was confined to his bed at Salem yesterday and it is uncertain when he can come. Word of his illness did not reach here until last night and a number of prominent local men had gathered to welcome him in.

Flags Stolen.—Some miscreants last night stole seven of the large flags along North Broadway and Central avenue. They simply took hold of the other ends of the flags and tore them from the ropes. E. K. Jones has secured a clew to the perpetrators and it is likely that arrests and prosecutions will follow. It is a serious offense to mutilate a United States flag. Last year, some one also stole part of the flags and pennants.

Dies in Walla Walla.—Word has been received here of the death of Geo H. LaDue at his home in Walla Walla, Wash., Aug. 13. Death was due to old age and ill results from a stroke of paralysis suffered a number of years ago. Mr. LaDue visited Coos county a few years ago and made many friends here. He formerly lived at Roseburg. A wife and son survive.
