INSTITUTE IS OVER FRIDAY

Annual Session Closes Here—State Superintendent Alderman Pleased.

The annual session of the Coos County Teachers Institute or Training School closed at the Marshfield High School building last evening. The session was a most successful one, the total enrollment considerably exceeding the hundred mark.

State Superintendent Alderman, who was present a few days, addressed the teachers a number of times. Mr. Alderman is much pleased with the development of Oregon's educational system and is a firm believer in the recently established county boards of education and the provision for a supervisor of schools to assist the county superintendents in the larger counties. While the system is still new and has not been on trial long enough to show material results, he is confident that by enlisting the interests of business men through service on the boards, it will result in systematizing and improving the schools generally and especially the rural schools.

Combine Institutes
Next year the Coos County Institute will be held at Bandon. There is talk of trying to have Curry county unite with Coos in holding a joint institute at Bandon, thus securing more and better instructors. It is likely that definite steps will be taken in this direction in the near future.
