BOY IN HOSPITAL WITH LEFT FOOT SHATTERED

Laverne Hoffman, 15, Accidentally Shot by Leo Rapp, 16, while Out Hunting.

The report of the first hunting accident of the season comes from Roseburg where as the result of an accident while out hunting Friday, Laverne Hoffman, son of Mrs. Gay Hoffman, of Roseburg, lies in Mercy hospital with his left ankle and foot horribly shattered by a charge of birdshot, fired from a 12 guage Winchester "pump" gun in the hands of his companion, Leo Rapp, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Rapp. The accident occurred on the Coos Bay wagon road, two miles west of Roseburg.

Each boy carried a shotgun on the hunt. Upon arriving at the place where the accident occurred, the Hoffman boy decided to unload his gun, which contained several shells. The ejector either refused to work or he did not know how to operate it, as he passed the weapon to his companion, Young Rapp found no difficulty ejecting the shells, but just before the last one was reached Hoffman stepped directly in front of the downward pointing muzzle, at the same time remarking: "There, that's all of them."

Presuming that Hoffman was correct as to the number of shells in the gun, Rapp released the hammer and the remaining shell in the gun was instantly discharged. As his companion fell with his foot shattered, Rapp hastened away for assistance.

WILL PROBE PANIC.
