least allowed him or the Southern Pacific a hearing relative to the terminal franchise in Marshfield. He said that he had wired various ones here, including Mayor Straw, to delay action until he could be present.

He said that it was a matter of much importance to the company and the community. He said that they wanted to cooperate with the community in building it up as the development here would be of mutual advantage to the local residents and the transportation company.

Until he has gone into the matter and taken it up with the company, he did not like to discuss the possible effect it may have. He said that it would not deter the Southern Pacific from building to Coos Bay but it might have some effect on what they would do on the Bay. "The means of egress to the west side of the Bay will determine much on what the company will do on the Bay," said Mr. Mills.

By the west side of the Bay, Mr. Mills referred to Marshfield and North Bend.

Mr. Mills also stated that the service to and from Coos Bay would be the best that a great transportation company such as the Southern company can afford.

Relative to the Coos Bay-Eugene line being a link in a proposed coast road, Mr. Mills said that it had not been planned on. So far the plans are merely for Marshfield as the terminus of the extension.

TANGLE OVER REAL ESTATE

Dr. Leslie and A. S. Dibble Differ Over Negotiations For Property.

An interesting tangle over Coos Bay real estate transactions developed today when Dr. G. W. Leslie served notice on Earl Dibble not to sell certain Ferndale property and that he was making application to the Court for enjoining any sale of lots there. Dr. Leslie contends that he has purchased the property in question from A. S. Dibble, formerly of Coos Bay but now of San Diego, while Earl Dibble, the latter's son and agent contends otherwise. It will probably have to be thrashed out in the courts. There are two versions to the story which differ materially.

Dr. Leslie bases his claim on actions of Alva Doll as his agent. In the latter part of July, Mr. Doll sent a telegram to A. S. Dibble offering \$1,700 for the block containing fourteen fifty-foot lots. Mr. Doll signed Dr. Leslie's name to it. An answer came back accepting the offer but it was addressed to Dr. Leslie who was then in the east and Mr. Doll's instructions to the telegraph office to have the message delivered to him were overlooked or forgotten. Finally a day afterward, the message was turned over to Mr. Doll who immediately deposited \$500 in the bank and had them notify Mr. Dibble. Then Mr. Dibble, according to the claims of Messrs Doll and Leslie, wired back to cancel the deal. They hold that his acceptance was bona fide and insist on it being carried out.

Earl Dibble admits the exchange of the telegrams but gives some additional details which he claims justified the cancelling of the sale. He stated that his father considered Dr. Leslie a close personal friend and when he received the wire offering \$1,700 for the property, which he had been trying to sell for \$2,000, he thought that Dr. Leslie was, as his friend, giving all it was worth. Then he wired back accepting it. However, the Western Union notified him that the message could not be delivered as Dr. Leslie was out of town and that Dibble would have to pay the charges. When he found this, he decided not to make any deal as he did not want to transact business through any agent. He notified the company not to deliver the message accepting the offer for the property and thought this ended it until the message came from the bank stating that the first payment had been deposited. Then he notified the bank that he would not accept the tender.

Meanwhile the announcement came from the Southern Pacific of the building of the line to Coos Bay and of course the value of the property is greatly enhanced.

Mr. Dibble had advertised the property for sale and this resulted in the legal proceedings this morning, staying the sale.

CHILE WHEAT IS GREAT CROP

Most Productful Variety of Grain Sourced After Years of Effort.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 23.—After four years experimenting with a variety of wheat known as Chile and imported from Turkestan, F. Blanchard, the western cereal expert of the Department of Agriculture, has succeeded in segregating the pure white seed from the mixture originally imported.

Chile averages 15 to 20 bushels more to the acre than the white Australian variety which is accepted as the standard by the farmers of the west, according to the tests just completed.

Blanchard considers the segregation of the new grain the greatest forward step in wheat culture in many years.
