# OFFICIALS ARE POOR SHOT

State Game Warden Finley Tells of Gov. West's Bad Marksmanship

State Game Warden Finley who has just returned to Portland has given the following story to a Portland paper concerning Gov. West's poor marksmanship during his trip through Coos and Curry counties: Gov. West has only himself to blame for his failure to shoot any deer on his recent hunting trip with State Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman and State Game Warden Finley. This statement was made by Mr. Finley, who has just returned from a two-week's visit to the Coos Country.

Mr. Finley admits that as Game Warden he refused to allow the Governor to hunt, because the Executive had failed to provide himself with a hunting license, but, on the other hand, he says it is doubtful whether the Governor could have hit a deer if he had been privileged to shoot at one.

In this connection Mr. Finley tells how the ranchers took pity on the Governor in his predicament and tied a buck for him at which to shoot. The Governor hit the limb instead of the buck, and the deer escaped.

Game Warden Finley says State Superintendent Alderman is hardly a better shot.

"We saw a good many deer," said Mr. Finley, "and Mr. Alderman had good shots at a buck. He had a Winchester, but at 50 yards he shot three feet over the buck. He was used to shooting with an automatic, and instead of putting in another shell after the first one was fired, he was so excited that he pulled on the trigger hard enough to bend. Then it would not work, and he asked Governor West for his gun. He didn't hit the buck at that shot either, in spite of the fact that he leaned the gun against a tree. His excuse was that the tree shook."

## "RATS" NO LONGER FASHIONABLE DRESS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 31.— "Rats" are under the ban in this season's styles of hairdress- ing, according to the dictum that went forth to the models at the "Made in St. Louis" show being held in the Coliseum here. The dictum, however, was not made in St. Louis. It came from Paris, and was conveyed by the woman who has come to rehearse the 12 models who have been named the "perfect" thirty-sixes." She told the models, to be in style next winter and spring, they would have to look like Venus de Milo. Venus did not wear corsets, and the fashion mentor told the models it is impossible to look as if you didn't have corsets if you wore rats. The display shows there is to be a revolution in women's dress styles for the next season. Curves and the mincing step that goes with the hobble skirt are to disappear, and in their places is to come the corsetless natural figure. Trousers are to replace the petticoat in this effort to realize the natural figure for women, but few women doubtless will follow the trou- sers idea—in public.

## LIGHTHOUSES REARRANGED.

**Double Flash to Obviate Wrecks Like That of Santa Rosa.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 1.— Because of the wreck of the steamer Santa Rosa which broke up on point Arguello, July 1, all single flashlights on the Pacific coast are to be changed to double flash lights. This, it is believed, will obviate the possibility of occurrences such as the mistaking of a railroad headlight for a lighthouse flash, as it was testified was done by the Santa Rosa's wheelman.
