They are large, of fine color and flavor. He has eighteen trees bearing this year and already gathered ten apples boxes of peaches from them. He says that this year's crop proves that peaches can be grown in commercial quantities and plans to put out a big orchard of them. While peaches have been raised in this section, they have never been produced in large quantities and never of the size, quality and flavor of those shown by Mr. Noah today. It is likely that a sample of them will be sent in the exhibit to the state fair.
