RAINFALL IS BELOW AVERAGE

Coos Bay Got 5.44 Inches Less Last Year Than the Nine-Year Average.

The total precipitation for the past twelve months ending September 1, on Coos Bay, was 61.66 inches, according to the official records kept by Mrs. E. Mings, government weather observer.

The average precipitation for the previous nine years was 67.55 inches so that the precipitation the past year was 5.89 inches less than the average.

Present Rain Good.

Although the rainstorm of Monday and Tuesday has put a crimp in the operations of the auto stage line between Coos and the railroad, it is generally accepted as very beneficial.

Ranchers are generally pleased with the rain, providing it does not last too long. It will not hurt any crop but will make good fall pastureage.

The resignation was presented to the council and was accepted. The mayor then recommended W. D. Rowland for the vacant position. It was moved that the appointment of Mr. Rowland be approved but the motion was lost. The matter of the appointment of a water superintendent was then laid over until the regular monthly meeting.

Lee Goodman has been employed as janitor of the main school building for another year and will begin at once to get the rooms ready for the opening of school on September 11. The Academy has been rented for another year and will be used for the first three grades. Mr. Fulton will do the janitor work for that building.
