

FREE DELIVERY IN MARSHFIELD

boxes. Fifteen drop letter boxes will be established at first in the district served and more may be placed later.

One condition of securing the service is a new ruling of the postoffice department that water-proof receptacles must be placed by all business houses and residences to receive the mail. Business houses can cut slots through the doors and have the boxes on the inside.

Mail carriers will not take mail to houses that are above the street level and reached by a flight of stairs. Occupants of this class of houses will have to place their mail box on the street level.

Parties living in the city just beyond the section served can have their mail delivered by erecting a mail box at the nearest point on the carrier's route and then carrying it from there themselves.

Mr. Morse expressed himself as pleased with what had been done in the way of sidewalk and street improvements and the numbering of buildings and the placing of street signs in the last two years. He said that the placing of the receptacles for mail was about the only condition that had to be complied with and as soon as Postmaster Curtis reports they have been provided, the free delivery service will probably be ordered established.

Mr. Morse stated that of course if the people did not avail themselves of the free delivery service but still insisted on getting it through the postoffice, the service could be ordered discontinued later.

"If the people will see that the road is put in condition so that the mail arrives here nearly on time, we will be glad to continue the service," continued Mr. Morse. "It won't require a great deal of money and is not beyond the people's ability to do it."

If the Sunday closing is inaugurated here, mail will probably be delivered only to transients. Local parties by notifying the office on Saturday that they are expecting a certain piece of mail from a certain place on Sunday can secure that piece only or can have it delivered to their homes by paying ten cents for special delivery service. People having lock boxes can obtain it. Persons getting their mail delivered by carrier can secure their mail in their boxes on Sundays only.

Talks About Roads.
Mr. Morse this morning took up the question of road improvements with Chairman Jennings of the special committee of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce. He urged that care be taken to prevent bad mud-holes or chuck-holes interfering.

Postoffice Inspector Morse of Portland arrived here Tuesday for his annual inspection of the local post-offices and also to look over the roads in here. He came in via the old Coos Bay wagon road, making the trip on the mail stage. He left Roseburg early in the morning and arrived here at 1:30 the next morning drenched to the skin.

"It used to be that the old Coos Bay wagon road had the reputation of being the worst highway connecting places of the size and importance of Roseburg and Marshfield of any road in the country," said Mr. Morse last evening. "I am willing to admit it has been improved some but it is still a very bad road. I can't understand why you people will permit it to remain in the condition it is. Neither can I understand how some people will expect excellent mail service over such a road."

"One little thing that could be done that would keep the mail much dryer and would not cost much. That would be to trim the branches that hang over the road and during rains beat the moisture through the canvass covering and sacks into the mail. I don't believe it would cost over \$100 to do this in both Douglas and Coos counties. More of it ought to be planned, especially near Sumner."

TO DEDICATE LOCAL CHURCH

Services at North Bend Sunday

Afternoon Feature of Lutheran Meeting.

The annual conference of the Portland Mission District of the Columbia Conference of the Augustana Synod will be held in the Swedish Lutheran churches in Marshfield and North Bend Saturday and Sunday. A feature of the meeting will be the dedication of the new Swedish Lutheran church at North Bend, which was recently completed.

The purpose of the conference is merely for a discussion of church work and the exchange of ideas as to the best means of forwarding the denomination in this section. No formal program has been announced. Rev. B. F. Bengtson, pastor of the local churches, has arranged to entertain the visiting pastors who will be in attendance.

The first of the programs will be held in Marshfield Saturday. On Sunday, the visiting clergymen will address the Sunday schools here and at North Bend and will also occupy the pulpits at the regular services.
