Sister Dead.—Mrs. Cal. Wright today received a telegram announcing that her sister, Mrs. R. M. Wade whose husband is head of the large hardware house of R. M. Wade and company in Portland, had died there suddenly Sunday. No particulars were given.

Is Appointed.—Prof. A. L. Hepburn, who was located here last year for awhile giving dancing lessons, in a card to The Times announces that he has been appointed dancing master at the Army and Navy Post at San Francisco which is the Western Headquarters of the Army.
