## ATTACH EVANS' GATE RECEIPTS

Controversy Over Loser's Portion of Saturday Night's Funds.

Before Justice Pennoek today, a case involving Bobbie Evans' share of the receipts of Saturday's night's prize-fight in Marshfield is being thrashed out. Evans' share of the receipts were attached by Jack Tawse of Bandon. Tawse's claim against Evans amounts to a little more than \$91 and is said to be for money advanced Evans. The share of the prize-fight receipts going to Evans was about \$58.

Mr. Matson claimed Evans' share of the receipts on a prior claim but Tawse's attorney claimed it was not legally turned over.

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## BOBBIE EVANS LOST TO BURNS

Seconds Throw Up Sponge In Twelfth Round of Go—Preliminaries Fast.

What was to have been a twenty-round bout between "Roughhouse" Charley Burns, and Bobbie Evans of Portland, was ended in the twelfth round Saturday night by Evans' seconds throwing up the sponge to prevent the latter being knocked out. The bout was a fast one in which Burns had decidedly the best of it almost from the start.

Earl Henderson, who fought a twenty-round draw with Burns here a few weeks ago, put Kid Gillen of Portland out in the first round of what was to have been a six round go. Henderson started it off at a terrific clip, so fast that Gillen could not either keep his head or his feet. After Henderson had landed on him a few times, Gillen made some wild lunges in which he fell two or three times and finally in the last one, Henderson swung both hands, landing on the back of Gillen's neck as the latter was going down and the latter took the count. Gillen claimed he was in no condition, having only trained two days but said he would like to meet Henderson in three weeks.

Billy Wilson was declared the winner of a five-round go with Kid Perry of Oakland. Wilson landed the most blows. Perry apparently not working himself as hard as he might. Some of the onlookers expressed disapproval of the decision, claiming it should have been declared a draw.

**In Good Shape.**

Burns appeared to be in much better condition than when he fought Henderson here a few weeks ago and made a decidedly better showing. The latter might possibly have been due to the fact that Evans is not nearly as clever a fighter as Henderson, not as fast or as well science and not as strong.

Evans on the start appeared confident and did most of the landing. Burns did not want to spar but throughout the bout kept rushing Evans and in the clinches generally landed several times to Evans' heart and stomach. Evans' punches appeared to lack steam and even when he did land, they did not even stop Burns' rushes.

In the first five rounds, Evans might have been said to have had a shade the best of it on points. The punishment that Burns was inflicting was not as evident as Burns did his work in close in clinches while Evans generally hit clean. Evans tried to offset Burns' rushes and bunting but did not have the strength to do so.

In the seventh, Burns landed a few to the back of Evans' neck and also on the latter's nose, getting the first blood. In the eighth, Evans' first showed signs of tiring under the grueling and for a moment it looked as though the round would see the end of the bout.

In the ninth, Evans went down three times but got up before the count ended. In the tenth, Evans came back and was apparently trying only to protect himself, evidently hoping to regain his strength. In the eleventh, he went down twice and was down when the going ended the round. Burns started off the twelfth round at a fast clip and soon had Evans down again and the latter's second threw the towel into the ring, ending the bout.

The crowd was not very large but most of them declared it was one of the best bouts they had ever seen. Burns is now to meet Earl Henderson here again in October.

Chas. Southart refereed the two preliminaries and Joe Schott, Henderson's manager, refereed the main event.
