MRS. WADE'S DEATH.

Particulars of Demise of Sister of Mrs. Cal. Wright.

The Roseburg News has the following concerning the death of Mrs. R. M. Wade, sister of Mrs. Cal Wright. "Mrs. R. M. Wade, pioneer of 1852, died suddenly from ear diseases this week, at her home, 400 Holladay avenue, Portland.

Mrs. Wade was the daughter of the late Jefferson Williams, a well-known pioneer of Douglas county. She was born in Sullivan county, Miss., in 1843, and at the age of 10, crossed the plains to Oregon. The family settled at a place now known as Looking Glass, near Roseburg. She was one of 13 children who all grew to manhood and womanhood.

Mrs. Wade is survived by her husband, two sons and two daughters—Walter S. Wade of Olex, Or.; R. L. Wade of Tillamook; Mrs. S. May Glafke and Mrs. Susan E. Newbegin, wife of Edward Newbegin, of Portland. Mrs. Wade was a member of the First Congregational church of Salem.

Other than the above relatives Mrs. Wade is survived by five brothers, T. J. Williams of Roseburg; Will Williams of Dillard; J. E. Williams of Roseburg; F. A. Williams of Looking Glass; four sisters, Mrs. Cochran of Portland, Mrs. Croxton of Spokane, Wash., Mrs. Cal Wright of Marshfield and Mrs. Lucy Ollivant of Roseburg."

MADE GOOD TIME.

Boston Average Seven Knots Going Up—Smaller Vessel Here.

In an article telling of the return of the Boston to the Columbia river, the Oregonian says: "Her speed for the trip, only four hollers working, was seven knots, about one knot better than was reeled off on the run down the coast.

"There probably will be a movement started to obtain a smaller vessel than the Boston for the Coos Bay and Bandon divisions," said Captain Reynolds. "I doubt if the Boston will be used for all the divisions in the future. There are over 20 men enlisted here and so far as I have ascertained they are hungry for the fall and winter drills. We expect to make greater progress this season than before and with assurances of state help and Navy Department assistance, there is every reason to believe that next summer the organization will be one to attract attention."
