NORTH BEND TO LIMIT SALOONS

Council Decides to Restrict Number There — Refuse Rush New License.

The North Bend city council at a meeting Tuesday night ordered drafted a new liquor ordinance restricting the number of saloons there to one for each 500 population and made provision that in case any of the present licenses were revoked, no new ones shall be issued until the population warrants the increase.

There are now six saloons in North Bend and under the proposed ordinance, this number cannot be increased until the population reaches 3,500 and it may be reduced to four in case of any infringements of the law by the proprietors as the present population there is 2,000.

Barnes Case Up. County Judge John F. Hall has refused a writ of habeas corpus sued for by H. M. Barnes, son of former marshal Barnes of North Bend, in the vehicle license case. Barnes was arrested in the latter part of August for failing to take out the required license. City Recorder Derbyshire gave him until September 1 to comply. Barnes did not and he was ordered haled before the court and a fine of \$25 or twelve and one-half days in jail was the sentence imposed. Barnes was taken to jail but the writ of habeas corpus was sued for. Before hearing could be had most of the sentence had expired so that after Judge Hall refused it, Barnes had little or no time to serve.

TO AID BAKERS FIGHT TRUST

American Federation of Labor Will Assist Workmen Against Bread Combine.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 14.—Frank Morrison, Secretary of the American Federation of Labor today pledged the support of the 1,700,000 members of the federation to the bakers in their fight against the "bread trust." The alleged "trust" is composed of three of the largest baking companies in the United States, who refuse to recognize the union.

FREAK STORM AT FERNDALE

Gust of Wind Does Slight Damage and Blows Children Into Bay Tuesday.

Residents in the vicinity of Ferndale report a most peculiar and unusual natural phenomenon that took place there Tuesday afternoon between 3 and 4 o'clock. It is described by those who witnessed it as a sort of miniature cyclone or typhoon. A large funnel shaped cloud seemed to form in the deep ravine that marks the road opening into Ferndale and swept down toward the bay in a northerly course.

It came up very quickly during the thunder shower Tuesday afternoon and lasted only a few minutes, but was witnessed by many persons. In the vicinity of Ferndale there was unusual darkness caused by the nearness and darkness of the cloud. People in other parts of the city also noted the unusual cloud but missed the view of the water spout which is described as a most magnificent sight while it lasted.

In its progress to the bay the wind cloud swept two children off the pier into the water. They were rescued with much difficulty by Tom Robinson who happened to be near at the time. The two boys who were blown into the bay were the four-year old and seven-year-old sons of Leo Call. The little fellow was badly scared and was laying down with his head under water when Mr. Robinson reached them.

"Toots" Noble, who was working near there, said that the wind caused a wave at least ten feet high to hit the island formed by the dredgings. Leonard Masters reports that the storm there was the most severe witnessed in years. There was a terrific downpour of rain and some hail and considerable lightning, one bolt shattering a tree about a half-mile from Sumner. No particular damage was done.

CHINESE ON WARPATH NOW
