Sale of Gulovson Corner Inclusive of Rapid Rise in Real Estate.

The recent sale of the Gulovson property at the southwest corner Broadway and Central avenues, called attention to the marked advances in Coos Bay real estate during the last few years. The enhancement of this one lot alone meant a big profit to the purchaser although no money has been expended in its improvement aside from assessments for street paving. records of the transfers are as follows:

March 24, 1887; George Durr the lot to F. P. Norton for \$10,000. August 30, 1902, F. P. Norton the property to W. O. Williams \$2,000.

June 25, 1904, W. O. Williams the lot to W. P. Gulovson for \$23,500. September 5, 1911, W. P. Gulovson sold the property to C. S. for W. S. Chandler for \$23,500.

This is probably the most valuable instance of the increase in value nearly as marked increases have been made in a number of pieces of local property that changed hands the past summer.
