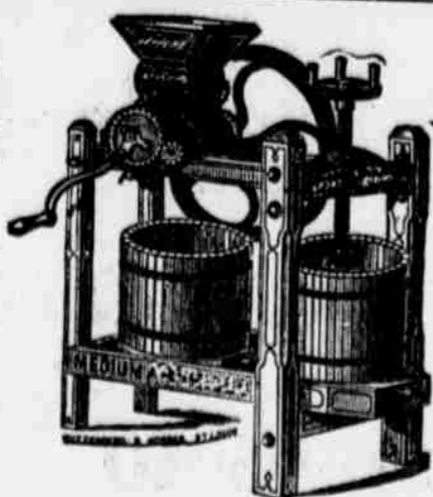

LOCAL APPLES EASY WINNERS

Coos County Gravensteins Beat Famous Hood River Product at Salem.

Returning triumphant from Salem where the Coos County Gravensteins apples captured first prize in competition with the far-famed Hood River apples at the Oregon State fair and also the fifth prize for the best county exhibit, F. B. Tichenor and Miss McKenzie, who had charge of the exhibit, reached here today.

Both were elated over the victories won and Mr. Tichenor was warmly congratulated by his friends here for his work. No one had anticipated that he would be able to win the high honors there that he did. "We can go back next year and capture first prize on the county exhibit," said Mr. Tichenor today. "The expenditure of a little money in collecting exhibits and the devotion of a little time to it will enable us to win in a walk. This year Clatsop county had a \$7,000 exhibit there and their showing made me more fully realize the great opportunity we have for getting up a state winner of an exhibition here.

"Our apples far outclassed Hood River's famous beauties in the exhibit Woodman day.

"We were busy at the booth from 8 in the morning until 11 o'clock at night answering questions and distributing literature. There will be hundreds of homeseekers visit Coos Bay within the next few months as a result of the showing made at the fair.

"A representative of a proposed Swedish colony of five hundred families is planning to come to this section soon with a view to locating them here. They want lots of logged off land at reasonable prices and they will build up their own community, establishing Swedish schools and churches. I have tried to tell them of the great chances in this section and I am in hopes of locating them here."

One of the prizes won by the exhibit was a set of silver fruit knives which was presented to Miss McKenzie by Mr. Tichenor in recognition of her faithful work there.

BANDON OIL PROSPECT.

Strong Gas Pressure Indicates Oil Is Near.

The Bandon Recorder says: "Yesterday at the well of the Miocene Oil & Gas Co., on Bear Creek, the drillers struck sand that very much resembles oil sand and is both odorous and greasy. The sand was struck under a layer of hard substance which had just been drilled through and the gas pressure which was already strong was greatly increased, and it now takes much more water than ever before to hold down the gas pressure. There is now about 1,150 feet of water in the hole. The work of drilling is moving on rapidly and they are putting down from 10 to 20 feet of pipe every day and the operators are becoming more sanguine every day as to the outcome."
