International Association of Machinists Places All In Their Hands.

JOINT CONFERENCE AT DAVENPORT DECIDES

President O'Connell Victorious In Clash With Socialists Faction.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times) DAVENPORT, Iowa, Sept. 26.—The International Association of Machinists at a joint session today with the heads of the allied trades, voted to leave action on the proposed strike on the Harriman lines to the executive officers with full power to act.

The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce last evening after a rather lengthy discussion, decided that the time was not opportune for engaging a high salaried man for manager of the promotion and publicity work on Coos Bay.

It was also decided to postpone action of the proposal to change the name of the organization to the Coos Bay Chamber of Commerce until North Bend business men could be consulted further about the idea of consolidating the commercial bodies under the new name.

It was decided to launch a membership campaign now and try and enroll every business man and property owner in Marshfield as members of the commercial organization preliminary to undertaking the boosting work on a big scale later.

BIG STAND OF TIMBER FOUND

D. C. McCarthy Finds 406,420,000 Feet In Twp. 28, Range 11.

The standing timber in Township 28, Range 11, which is along the Middle Fork Road near Dora, aggregates a total of 406,420,000 feet, according to the official cruise of it just completed by County Cruiser D. C. McCarthy.

The total area of the township is 22,819.84 acres and of this, 8,179.29 is not timbered leaving the total forest area 14,640.55. This would mean an average stand of 27,760 feet per acre on the timbered area.

Eighty-Eight Others Injured and One Missing of Sunken Battleship's Crew.

EIGHT INJURED ARE RESCUED OFF VESSEL

Seamen Penned In on Partly Submerged Vessel For Over Twenty-Six Hours.

TOULON, France, Sept. 26.—An official statement of the casualties on the Liberte places the dead at 235 and the injured at 88 with one man missing.

The search of the wreckage of the battleship continued throughout the night with the aid of great torches. During the night fifty bodies were recovered and eight wounded rescued from that part of the vessel that remained exposed when the hull sank.
