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ITALY DECLARES WAR ON TURKEY TODAY AND HOSTILITIES WILL OPEN ANY MOMENT

STRIKE OF EMPLOYES OF SOUTHERN PACIFIC AND ILLINOIS CENTRAL CALLED FOR TOMORROW

Declaration of Hostilities Effective at 2:30 O'clock This Afternoon.

BLOCKADE OF ALL PORTS IS ARRANGED Sultan's Refusal to Comply With Ultimatum Leads to Quick Action.

STRENGTH OF NATIONS. Italy has a standing army of 225,000 and 300,000 reserves with 1,200,000 unorganized available for duty. Turkey has a standing army of 375,000, with 350,000 reserves and 2,000,000 unorganized men available for duty.

LAND MEN TODAY (By Associated Press.) MALTA, English colony, Sept. 29.—A telegram from Tripoli says twelve Italian warships are anchored off Tripoli and it is expected a landing will be effected this afternoon.

ROME, Italy, Sept. 29.—It is officially announced here that Italy and Turkey are in a state of war beginning at half past two on the afternoon of Friday, September 29. The reason given is that Turkey has failed to meet the demands contained in the Italian ultimatum.

Sultan Opposes Military Occupation of Tripoli. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

PARIS, France, Sept. 29.—A dispatch to the Havas agency from Constantinople says Turkey recognizes completely the economic interests of Italy but will not accept the proposed Italian military occupation of Tripoli.

TURKISH REPLY TO ULTIMATUM

Sultan Expresses Surprise at Stand Italy Has Suddenly Taken Against Him. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times) CONSTANTINOPLE, Turkey, Sept. 29.—The Turkish reply to the ultimatum of Italy, which demanded assurances there would be no resistance to the Italian occupation of Tripoli and Cyrene communicated to the Italian charge d'affaires, Signor Di Martino, this morning. The message was couched in friendly terms and expressed surprise at the action of Italy in view of the cordial relations existing between the two countries.

ARABS FIGHT UNTIL DEATH

Renew Oath of Unity and Allegiance to Turkey to "Last Drop of Blood." (By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times) TRIPOLI, Sept. 29.—Nearly all the Europeans last night left on orders from the Italian consul and this morning the streets are deserted except for squads of Turkish soldiers, who are enthusiastic over the situation. The Arabs have held mass meetings in all the mosques and taken the solemn oath of unity and allegiance to the Turkish flag "to the last drop of blood."

PROSPERITY IS TAFT'S DESIRE

President In Speech at Waterloo Urges Restoration of Confidence. (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) WATERLOO, Ia., Sept. 29.—President Taft received an enthusiastic welcome when he reached this place yesterday. He delivered a lengthy address, his subject, "The Relation of Government to the Business of the Country," being one of the most important he is to deliver on his present tour. After stating his attitude on railroad regulation, the trusts, the tariff and the monetary situation, President Taft concluded his address as follows: "We must have investments from which to secure a large wage fund, which is needed to support the wage earners. We must inspire in the business men who control those investments the confidence that they will not be driven out of business. If railroads are unjustly legislated against by State legislation to the point where they can not do a profitable business, the injury is more direct to the wage earners of the railway than it is to the shareholder, because the shareholders presumably are people who have some other means of livelihood than the dividends from the stock, while the wage earners are entirely dependent on a continuance of conditions which make the wages fund large and supports the wage earner and his family. "Let us reason together. Let us be charitable and kind. Let us not be so suspicious and ascribe corrupt motives to everyone in the community but our particular friends and political associates. Let us do teamwork in the community. Let us have legislation that helps, or an absence of legislation if it be unnecessary. And let us approve and praise the great business enterprise and genius that honestly and by proper methods accumulates property and puts it into productive industries, supports the thousands of workmen, and furnishes profit to those whose savings have gone into the shares and bonds of the enterprise. "This is the hope I have for the future. Business is halting now. There is doubt and distrust among

STRIKE ORDER WIRED TO LOCALS EARLY TODAY

Union Leaders Declare That Men Will Stick Together In Great Struggle.

STRIKE ORDER ISSUED

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 29.—The following is the text of the Union strike order: "All efforts have failed. Kruttschnitt refuses. All crafts strike Saturday, September 30, at 10 A. M. Letter of instructions follows. Let every man do his duty."

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 29.—The shopmen on the Harriman lines and Illinois Central will go on a strike at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning according to statements by J. W. Kline, president of the Blacksmith's Union. The strike order was issued and the time set this morning, after a conference with five union presidents.

ISSUE STRIKE ORDER

Heads of Boilermakers and Carmen's Unions Issue It Today. (By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.) KANSAS CITY, Sept. 29.—Following a conference here today between Presidents J. A. Franklin and M. F. Ryan of the Boilermakers and Carmen's Unions respectively, the two men sent out strike orders to members of their unions this afternoon. President Franklin and Ryan of the Boilermakers and Carmen's Unions, respectively, corroborated the statement of President Kline of the Blacksmiths Union, given in Chicago, to the effect that the time for calling the strike was agreed on this morning in a conference by wire.
