SITUATION ON SUNDAY. Both Sides Devoted Day to Preparing For Great Struggle.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 2.—The railroad officials and shopmen on the Harriman lines passed Sunday in preparation for the struggle which begins in earnest today.

Little or no violence was reported up to Sunday night. The number of men who quit work in the fifteen states was estimated between fifteen and twenty thousand by the union leaders.

Traffic on the Harriman lines continued Saturday and Sunday, without interruption. The response to the strike order was most general in the Middle West and South.

ESTIMATE LOSS OF LIFE IN FLOOD FROM 100 TO 300

Exact Number of Victims of Disaster at Austin, Pa., Still Matter of Speculation—Damage \$6,000,000.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) AUSTIN, Pa., Oct. 2.—This town is desolated today. Ruin everywhere testified to the power of the rushing water from the collapsed dam of the Bayless Paper company and crepe on many doors gives mute evidence of the terrible death toll exacted by the flood.

AUSTIN, Pa., Oct. 2.—With the

estimates ranging from that of Burgess Martin, who places the loss of life at not more than 150 and perhaps less than 100 to that of Chief of Police Baker, who took an informal census Sunday, which is at least 300, the extent of the loss of life Saturday when the great dam of the Bayless Pulp and Paper company burst, is still a matter of speculation.

Burgess and others familiar with the conditions here, estimate the damage by flood waters which swept over this place to be about \$6,000,000. Three hundred houses were destroyed.

Auto Saves Life. At Costello, three miles below here, warning was brought by a man in auto and practically every person in the village of 500 people made escape to the hills.

Sunday was spent in relief work, and some attempt to remove the wreckage. There has been no organized effort as yet. The state constabulary on the scene and last night no one without a pass could secure entrance to the town.

The district attorney will summon several experts employed in the construction of the dam, in an effort to find the cause of the disaster.

SCHLEY DROPS DEAD IN EAST

Hero of Santiago Suddenly Stricken on New York Street Today.

Schley was stricken near the corner of 44th street and Fifth avenue while on his way down town. He died before medical aid could reach him.

Dr. Miller of Flower hospital, said Schley's death was due to apoplexy. HERO OF SANTIAGO.

Admiral Schley commanded one of the American fleets and Admiral Schley jumped into fame at the time of the destruction and capture of the Spanish fleet, in command of Admiral Cervera, at Santiago, during the Spanish-American war. SUES TO GET LARGE AMOUNT

Jorden Schapers Begins Action to Collect \$18,000 From Simpson Co.

Jorden Schapers of North Coos River, near Allegany, today began suit in the Circuit court against the Simpson Lumber company for \$18,579.39 which he alleges is due him for logs, piling, labor and other services.

He alleges that he has had an open account with the Simpson Lumber company since 1901 and that during that time the money involved totals about \$36,000 and that there remains unpaid and unsettled the amount he is suing for. He alleges that he has repeatedly demanded a settlement of the company but has been unable to get it. R. O. Graves instituted the suit for Mr. Schapers.

TURKS LEAVE TRIPOLI CITY

Sultan's Forces Evacuated Soon After Italian Bombardment Began.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.) TRIPOLI, Septentrional Africa, Oct. 2.—The Turks evacuated this city Saturday immediately after fire was opened on the forts by the Italians. The Turks apparently retreated with the intention of preparing for resistance in the interior.

ASK AID OF POWERS. Turkey Wants European Nations to Intervene.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.) CONSTANTINOPLE, Turkey, Oct. 2.—It is officially announced that the Italians have bombarded the port of Reshadie. One of the Turkish torpedo boats there was damaged. Later they entered the port of Muste and took the captain of the port and three boatmen prisoners. The cabinet has prepared a message to the powers urging intervention.

RUMORS OF BATTLE. Report That Turkish Fleet Evaded Italian Squadron.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.) PARIS, France, Oct. 2.—Agence Fournier at midnight Sunday sent out a dispatch under a Rome date that a great battle was in progress Saturday in the straits of the Dardanelles. Later the Agence sent out a dispatch that this report seemed confirmed. A message under a Constantinople date Sunday, however, says that the fleet is safe and the Turkish commander evaded the Italian fleet.

Conflicting Rumors Keeps World Guessing as to What Is Happening.

GERMANY TAKES STEPS TO BRING ABOUT PEACE

Turks Reputed to Have Deserted Tripoli When Italy Opened Bombardment.

KAISER ATTEMPTS TO RESTORE PEACE

(By Associated Press.) BERLIN, Germany, Oct. 2.—It was stated at the Foreign Office this evening that although no offer of mediation has been made, the German ambassador at Constantinople already is working actively at the Turkish capital to effect a peaceful settlement between Italy and Turkey.

CAUSE OF TROUBLE. Italy, in demanding the right to occupy Tripoli immediately, made three allegations against Turkey, which owns the rich state in the north of Africa.

These allegations are: That Italian subjects have been arbitrarily arrested in Constantinople and have been imprisoned, despite remonstrances made by the Italian government. That the life and property of Italian subjects are not secure in Tripoli.

That the Turkish authorities refuse to force the release of an Italian girl held by an Ottoman, after being asked to do so by the Italian government. Unquestionably, Italy wants Tripoli for trade purposes and for colonization. Facts About Tripoli. Tripoli, domain of the Turks for years, has a commercial business valued at \$4,000,000 annually, which is derived from domestic products, consisting of wool, wheat, oil and cattle, and the Central African exports of gold, feathers, ivory and rubber.

Its area is 400,000 square miles, equal to the combined areas of the three Pacific coast states and Nevada included. The population, consisting mostly of Berbers and Moors, is estimated at 1,000,000.

LONDON, England, Oct. 2.—Strict Italian censorship is keeping the world in the dark in regard to the progress of events in the Mediterranean. Conflicting rumors and reports continue to come in. One cablegram announced definitely that Tripoli had been bombarded and occupied, and another that no attack on the city had been made. It is certain the Italians had not attacked the town up to midnight Saturday for the guns would have been heard on the steamer Castle Garden which left Tripoli shortly after that hour and arrived at Malta today. Reports on the situation at Preveza are equally conflicting.
