MRS. WATKINS MAKES REPORT

Coos Bay Official of Oregon W. C. T. U. Makes Statement of Year's Work.

The Oregon State Convention of the W. C. T. U. will open at Medford today. Mrs. Maud B. Watkins of Marshfield, state superintendent of the Temperance and Labor Department of the W. C. T. U., was to have been present but was unable to be present. She sent the following self-explanatory report which will be read at the convention next Saturday.

A resume of the special work in the Department of Temperance and Labor as planned and in operation in the State of Oregon, year ending September 1911, is:

Inaugurate study clubs wherever possible: Two reported as having held classes during the year.

A movement to establish in the churches the social welfare studies of the social service institute, as outlined in the Magazine "The Gospel of the Kingdom"; the prospect of many churches taking it up is very bright, some have already done so. This we hope will be a state wide plan.

Printed and circulated 1,000 anti-treat cards.

The founding of a special literature fund for the purpose of publishing special labor literature. (See Mrs. Additon's offer).

Literature (specially and topically selected) distributed at factories and shops of all kinds, in homes and direct to the wage earner voter thru the postoffice.

Specially prepared scrap books in barber shops.

Out door Gospel temperance meetings (these have been signally successful in arresting thought).

Co-operating with state labor commissioner in the work of enforcing labor laws. Will present at next legislature several bills in behalf of labor and aid in the passing of such laws presented by labor as we consider right and just.

Special visitor work under our social visitor plan of national circular has proved of inestimable value.

Noon meetings at factories and shops have met with success.

Sunday afternoon meetings in large lodging houses and in mission rooms bids fair to prove a move in the right direction.

The letter guild wherein letters are written regularly to working girls is a bright plan of one of our purity workers.

Placing the "American Motherhood in the hands of working mothers, has met with good results—one Union reports 12-A plan to introduce our sociological work in every college and university is under way.

U. of O., Pacific College, O.A.C., O. State Normal have reported favorably already.

Press work has been pushed, especially articles on no shopping on Saturday afternoons or the week prior to Christmas.

County and state conventions have passed unanimously the shopping pledge and our constituency of 300 are having a mighty arrest of thought along this line.

400,000 pages of literature distributed in this state and doubtless much more if the Unions had carefully kept count of the amount circulated the last week of the recent campaign for "Oregon dry"; over 100,000 have been published by the state and county of Multnomah, with special reference of winning the labor vote for state wide prohibition.

Special literature is now being printed and circulated on Woman's suffrage and the labor question with the aim of securing the labor vote for woman's suffrage in the coming campaign and the national lecturer, Mrs. L. F. Additon takes part in the debate at the State Convention.

Two working girls have been rescued from a bad lodging house and been found good work.

One social visitor has constantly from one to five or six girls in her own home tiding them over a "no work" period and getting them work.

20 visits were made into saloons trying to find one woman's husband and get him home out of liquor's clutches.

50 visits reported in laborer's homes and four cases of confinement were cared for free.

In the recent campaign, the Grange was with us in getting Oregon dry.

A loan fund has been established

to aid deserving working girls.

Investigations have been made into the conditions of laundries, canneries and lodging houses and the facts revealed would make a human interest story of startling significance and would prove to all the dire necessity of this Labor Department, we are glad to report the inauguration of a vice commission of 15 by the city of Portland and that there are four women on the commission of which one is a White Ribboner, Mrs. Lora Baldwin, who is also a Police Officer of the city, that of the "Department of Safety to Girls" and she is doing a marvelous work.

Many Unions of the state are co-operating with the Portland commons in its great work for the "Down and Out men" Mr. McClaren deserves our aid and constant prayers and we think the work of the Farm Colony should be aided with an appropriation from the State Legislature.

Our societies will also work with others in demanding of the state an Industrial school for wayward girls—the need is very great.

Co-operate with the Consumer's League in gaining an early closing law and in sustaining the demands of the Consumer's League standard.

The Multnomah county superintendent of temperance and labor, being a national lecturer in this department, Oregon is able to profit by her intelligent understanding of this work and to have at most reasonable rate her services as lecturer or leader of social science classes and institutes. She conducts two classes in Portland Mrs. L. F. Additon of Lents. We have also to report that besides the 7 leaflets she has written for the national department, she has also published (in connection with Miss Gotshall, publisher, Portland), 5 leaflets in Multnomah county. Two during the campaign; and these have had wide circulation through the state.

Mrs. Additon stands ready to lend to any county a recommended list of books and pamphlets for study clubs.

We recommend that every county seat will work for two social centers: one, the rural school house with a systematic course provided of lectures, concerts of a high order, also debates on leading social and industrial questions. The second social center to be in form of a coffee house including reading room and all the conveniences that go with a comfort station.

We recommend that every Union will contribute toward the maintenance of a social settlement at Portland, as Massachusetts does at Boston.

We recommend that our national lecturer of the department be sent as a fraternal delegate, next year to the federation of labor convention and the State Grange convention.

AMEND CHARTER IN NORTH BEND

may build as well as to its main lines.

Another amendment suggested was that the company be required to give a bond similar to the one given in Marshfield guaranteeing that it will construct the road. Also that the company use three-inch instead of two-inch plank in planking between and outside of the rails at crossings.

Also that a clause be inserted which shall enable the council in the future to determine by ordinance the limit of time that the company may block traffic on streets by switching.

Also that a clause be inserted that any violation of the common user clause of the franchise shall mean the forfeiture of the franchise.

Another change suggested was that the company be restricted to the use of electricity on all lines except the belt line along the water front, that is that steam could be used only on lines between Sherman avenue and the waterfront as far as Montana street where the waterfront line turns and proceeds westward of Montana across Pony Inlet. The company wanted the right to use steam on Broadway. Besides the application for the steam line, the company asks franchisees for the use of electricity on all the principal streets in North Bend.

City Attorney Mullen was instructed to redraft the franchise and insert these suggestions.

PLAN FOR BIG REVIVAL HERE

Coos Bay Churches to Unite Campaign—Services at Tabernacle.

Preliminary arrangements were made at a meeting at the Marshfield Baptist church last evening for protracted revival services to be held in Marshfield in which it is expected that practically all of the churches on the Bay will participate. The local ministers will take turns in conducting the services.

The plan now is to open the meetings with a union meeting at one of the churches, probably the Baptist, next Sunday evening. Later, the meetings will be held in the Tabernacle which will be overhauled and put in condition for the services.

A large choir will probably be organized to assist in the work. The campaign includes plans for a general moral uplift on the Bay.

An invitation will probably be extended to the North Bend congregations to unite in the revivals.

The complete plans for the revivals will be announced in a day or two.

As a committee to investigate as to what can be done about amending the North Bend charter as desired by the company. They are to report next Tuesday evening when the council meet to take up the franchise again.
