MARSHFIELD CITY ORDINANCE NUMBER 311

SECTION 7.—Theatres, shows, exhibitions, and entertainments shall pay a license fee of Five Dollars per day, Thirty-Five Dollars per quarter, or One Hundred Dollars per year; provided that no patent medicine or goods, wares or merchandise of any kind whatsoever, nor any ticket or other device entitling any person to any such goods, wares or merchandise or patent medicine or any medical or other examination or advice shall be sold or given away either directly or indirectly or in any manner disposed of in any theatre or hall unless in addition to the license of such theatre or hall a license fee of Twenty Dollars per day shall be paid for such privilege; provided however that whenever the receipts of any theatre, concert, play, exhibition, lecture or entertainment is to be or will be appropriated to any church, school or religious or benevolent purpose within the city of Marshfield, the mayor may in his own discretion remit such license.
