## GROWTH OF DOUGLAS FIR

Government Foresters Issue Pamphlet On It.

"The growth and management of Douglas fir in the Pacific Northwest" is the title of a circular just issued by the forest service, which will be of live interest to the lumbermen and timber land owners of Oregon and particularly of Coos county.

This is one of the first publications of the government which deals solely with a forest problem of the Pacific Northwest, and it goes at the very most important topic of the region, namely how to manage Douglas fir timber land so as to get a second crop. The publication is the result of a thorough study of virgin forests, "second growth" stands and logged off lands of the foothills of the Cascades of western Washington and Oregon, made by foresters from the Portland office of the forest service, in which 1807 trees were "analyzed" and over 250 sample acres measured.

The circular presents in its 27 pages tables showing the rate of growth of this tree and the yield of "second growth" stands. Some of the figures show a yield that will be surprising to those who do not realize the wonderfully rapid growth that Douglas fir attains in western Oregon.

The table shows that the average tree from 10 to 20 years old grows .43 inches in diameter and 2.58 feet in height each year, and that when it is 50 years old it is adding to its volume 12 board feet a year and that when it is 140 years old it is adding 19 board feet each year.

The table showing the yield of average stands of "second growth" shows an equally astonishing result. One hundred year old timber has 79,800 feet per acre, which is equivalent to a growth of 800 board feet of merchantable timber on that acre every year during its first century of growth.

As to reforestation the circular says: "That the growing of crops of Douglas fir on cut over land will be financially profitable to private owners seems assured in view of the certain rise in the valuation of stumpage, the growing security of timberland investments, and the increased market for young timber, provided only that the system of taxing timberlands is reformed so that such lands bear only their just share of taxation."
