NOTICE OF SALE OF IMPROVEMENT BONDS. Notice is hereby given, that sealed bids will be received by the Finance committee of the City of Eastside, in Coos county, Oregon, at the office of the Recorder of said city, until the hour of 6 o'clock p. m. of the 24th day of October, 1911, for street improvement bonds of said city.

Said bonds aggregate in amount \$5,488.90. They are issued in denominations of \$500 and less. They bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from the date thereof, payable semi-annually. The said bonds mature in ten years from the date they bear.

Any bond may be fully paid and cancelled after one year from the date thereof, at the time of any semi-annual coupon period, upon notice. The common council reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Every bid must designate the denomination of the bond desired and must be accompanied by a certified check equal to five per centum of the amount bid, which shall be forfeited in case the bidder refuses to accept the bonds applied for.

All bids must be sealed in plain envelopes and endorsed, "Bid for Improvement Bond of the City of Eastside," without any other distinguishing mark. Dated this 2nd day of October, 1911.
