# MYRTLE POINT DEALERS FINED

Four Arrested and Punished For Violating Fruit Law—County Society.

(Special to The Times.)  
COQUILLE, Ore., Oct. 12.—Fruit Inspector P. M. Hall-Lewis, on Wednesday at Myrtle Point, took J. Machado, Joe Noyes, J. T. Guerin and R. W. Lundy before Justice Dodge, upon charges of violation of the Act of 1907 relating to the marking of fruit packages with the name and address of the grower and packer. Pleas of guilty were entered by the accused and the Judge imposed the minimum fine in each case.

**COOS COUNTY SOCIETY**  
A county Horticultural Society is being formed with headquarters at the County-seat, for the purpose of systematically cleaning up the prevalent orchard diseases. Representative citizens are taking a lively interest in the project, for Inspector Hall-Lewis has demonstrated that, contrary to the general supposition, there does exist a very considerable commercial apple crop in Coos county.

It is interesting to note, that the revenue to be derived from the yield of the sixty thousand bearing trees in the County, (a matter of some 300,000 boxes), would be nearly sufficient to pay the entire County Road Tax. Of course under present conditions, a very small portion of this yield is of a salable quality, and it is the purpose of the new organization to reverse the existing order of things in this respect.
