NOT A NEW DEVICE.

It is little less than astonishing that men of real ability are talking about the recall as though it were some new device of anarchy, when the very basis of the English parliamentary system is the recall, and when, with all our elective offices, we in this country resort to periodical recall.

Every argument against the recall can be found in the old debates over giving judges definite terms and re-electing them at the expiration.

There is nothing whatever new about the recall. It merely gives elasticity to our too rigid term of office. If the people are to pass upon the services of an officer why should it not be at the time when something has been done to bring that service into question? It happens too frequently now that our elections come when the issues are not defined and there is no vital interest.

The "mob" is no more enthroned with the recall than it is under any form of popular rule. The people can be called the "mob" at an annual election just as well as at a special election. It is no protection against the "mob" to keep the people from doing what ought to be done at the proper time.

EUGENE VIEW OF IT.

The Marshfield Times of October 13 prints a highly interesting railroad story to the effect that indications point to the Canadian Pacific as behind the Wilsey road projected from Tillamook to Eugene and on to Coos bay. This sounds plausible. There are many reasons why the Canadian Pacific would want a coast line to San Francisco, and if it is this road that is backing Wilsey there will be a lively race between the Southern Pacific and the Canadian extension for control of coast territory. It is also more than likely that the Hill line would have more than a friendly interest in a Canadian line to Frisco.

NOTICE OF SALE OF IMPROVEMENT BONDS.

Notice is hereby given, that sealed bids will be received by the Finance committee of the City of Eastside, in Coos county, Oregon, at the office of the Recorder of said city, until the hour of 6 o'clock p. m. of the 24th day of October, 1911, for street improvement bonds of said city.

Said bonds aggregate in amount \$5,488.90. They are issued in denominations of \$500 and less.

They bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from the date thereof, payable semi-annually.

The said bonds mature in ten years from the date they bear.

Any bond may be fully paid and cancelled after one year from the date thereof, at the time of any semi-annual coupon period, upon notice.

The common council reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

Every bid must designate the denomination of the bond desired and must be accompanied by a certified check equal to five per centum of the amount bid, which shall be forfeited in case the bidder refuses to accept the bonds applied for.

All bids must be sealed in plain envelopes and endorsed, "Bid for Improvement Bond of the City of Eastside," without any other distinguishing mark.

WILL PLAY AT MYRTLE POINT

MARSHFIELD HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL TEAM WILL GO TO COQUILLE VALLEY TOWN SATURDAY FOR GAME.

The High School football team will journey to Myrtle Point Saturday and meet the team representing that high school for the second time this year.

Marshfield won from Myrtle Point by a decisive score of 25 to 0 in the first game of the season, and while confident of victory, the local boys are prepared for a hard game.

Marshfield's team has been somewhat disorganized during the past week, Smith, f. b., Johnson, r. g., and Curtis, c., being out of the game on account of grades. However their places have been filled by subs, who are rapidly rounding into shape, and Capt. Clarke and Coach Grannis expect to send over nearly as strong a team as that which defeated Myrtle Point in the first game.

Marshfield's work has been exceptionally good this year, considering the material at hand. The team is the lightest in the history of the school averaging only about 143 pounds, while in former years the average has seldom fallen below 150 pounds. However, the nerve and more open style of play makes faster work possible, and it is on speed that Marshfield depends to win its games.

The next game at home will be with North Bend on Oct. 28, and everybody is advised to get their tickets early and avoid the rush.
