CHINESE REVOLUTION TO SPREAD

Imperial Forces Reported to Have Been Badly Defeated at Hankow.

REBELS ALSO CONTROL STRATEGIC POINTS NOW

Foreign Legations Prepare For the Worst-Rebellion Fast Gaining.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

PEKIN, China, Oct. 21 .- Persistent rumors have it that Admiral Shah Ping's flagship was sunk or captured in the recent fighting at Hankow. It is also reported that the rebels control several important strat-egic points. There is little in the news received today to reassure the government or relieve the general feeling of uneasiness. The missionaries in this province have been warned by students there will be a revolutionary outbreak near Pekin tomorrow. Considerable credence is attached to the warning.

In view of the possible spread of the rebellion, the foreign legations are taking the necessary military and commissary precautions in this city and TienTsin for the protection of the legation and citizens of the respective countries they represent.
