LEARNED MORE THAN HE EXPECTED.

Coos County Man Pleased With Oregon Agricultural College Course.
OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., Oct. 21.—"I shall say, for my part, regarding the work I took up, I certainly learned more out of it than I expected, only wishing the short course had been a week or two longer," said Victor Lindstrom of Cooston, in reply to a letter from Dean Cordley of the Agricultural college asking for suggestions for making the course this year more helpful than last.

Although many would like to see the course extended in length, as Mr. Lindstrom suggests, it has been decided that it is wiser to shorten it to four weeks, but offer a larger number of courses in that time, each devoted exclusively to the interests of some one class of growers, as the vegetable gardeners, prune growers, raisers of small fruits, peach and plum orchardists, and those in dry farming regions.

REJECTED SUITOR SUES GIRL FOR \$12 HE SPENT ON HER.

Peter B. Hall, who lives up Connecticut way, is a candidate for the championship belt of a bad sport. Hall has sued Miss Theresa Aichler for \$12.53, which he says he spent while "keeping company" with the young lady during the period from June 7 to June 22.

The bill of particulars contains a number of entries for trolley fares—no taxis for Pete—and also the following items, to-wit: Ice cream, 10 cents; supper, 45 cents; dinner, 63 cents; shore dinners, \$1; hiring horse and wagon, \$1; chocolate, 35 cents; hiring horse, \$1.50; supper, 60 cents, with tip to waiter, 25 cents.

THE HIGH COST OF SOULS.

Rev. "Billy" Sunday, the former baseball player who has conducted evangelistic meetings in almost every part of the country, has succeeded, he thinks, in reducing the saving of souls to a businesslike basis. He has gone so far as to make an estimate of the cost of soul saving in various cities. In Mr. Sunday's cost sheet, Indianapolis souls come highest at \$620 each.

New York City souls are quoted at \$545, while in Boston they can be obtained for \$450. Other quotations are Denver \$425, Chicago \$395 and New Orleans \$78.

So far as Mr. Sunday has made investigations, souls came cheapest in Atlanta, where they may be saved for \$75 a head—if souls have heads. "Billy" Sunday's figures have aroused much mystification and considerable adverse criticism. Atlanta complainers because souls are so cheap and Indianapolis people because they are so dear. The general impression seems to be that "Billy" Sunday acquired the percentage habit in his baseball days and hasn't been able to shake it off.—From "Success Magazine."

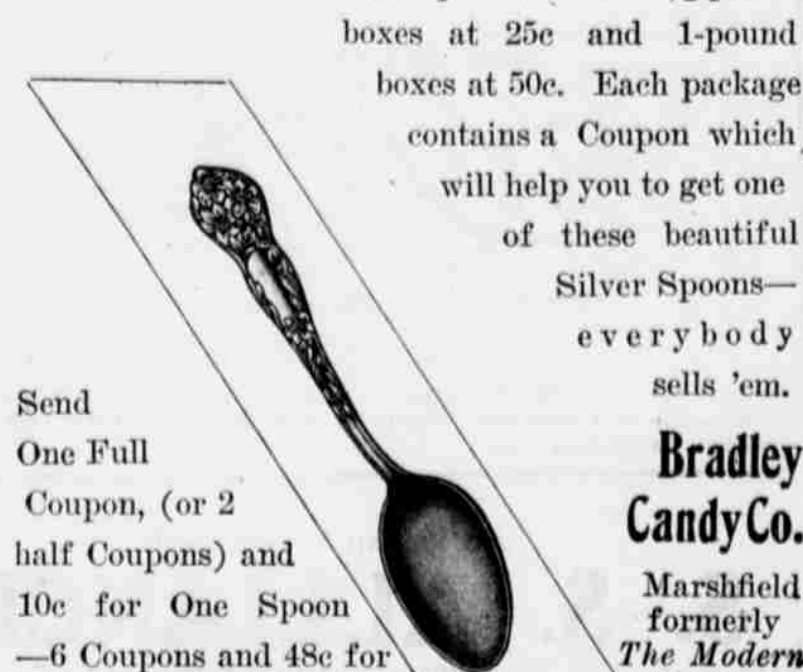
