

A Battle of Alertness Between the Hunter and His Prey.

ESKIMO SEALERS.

The Eskimo method of hunting seals shows a primitive calling improved to a fine art. When a seal is discovered the direction of the wind is at once noted. Then the hunter, keeping himself to the leeward of the seal, walks up to within about a quarter of a mile of it. Beyond this he begins to crouch and advances only when the seal's head is down.

Now, as the sent is one of the most wideawake of animals and has the habit of throwing up its head quickly every few seconds to guard against danger, it follows that the Eskimo has to be extremely alert if he would get his seal. When the seal's head is down upon the ice its eyes are shut, and it is said that in these brief intervals it takes its sleep.

The hunter by carefully watching the seal's movements is able without much difficulty to get within about 200 yards of it, but at closer quarters be is obliged to employ other tactics. He lies down at full length on the ice. Then the real sport begins.

When the seal's head is down the hunter, who keeps a keen eye on his prey, is able to approach still nearer by dragging himself forward on his elbows. This maneuvering continues for some time until the distance between man and beast has been reduced to a few yards.

When near enough to make a sure shot the Eskimo takes his bow and arrow from his side and sends a swift shaft through the head of his outwitted companion. Sometimes instead of the bow and arrow a harpoon is used with equal effect.-Harper's Weekly.

THE FARMER ACQUITTED.

The cost of living continues to mount. But the farmer is acquitted of responsibility for it, in figures just made public. They are in line with findings made by the Department of Agriculture and other authorities, says the Portland Journal.

The farmer gets but 44 per cent of what the consumer pays for farm products sold in New York City in a year. The statement is issued as a result of investigations made at the instance of B. F. Yoakum, a well known railroad president.

Here are some of the Yoakum figures: for eggs, the former gets \$17,-Coquille, is in Marshfield on business. 258,000 and the consumer pays \$28,750,000. For rice, the farmer receives \$1,334,000 and the consumer

For his cabbage sold in New York, the farmer is paid \$1,825,000, and it costs the consumer \$9,125,000. The farmer gets \$821,000 for onions that go to the consumer for \$8,212,-000. It is a profit to the middlemen of about 900 per cent.

For New York mak, the farmer is paid \$22,912,000, but it costs the consumer \$48,880,000. For potatoes the farmer gets \$3,425,000 and the consumer pays \$60,000.000.

For meat and poultry in New York, the farmer receives \$209,427,000 and they go to the consumer at \$491,000,-000. The figures are another substantiation of the statement that it GUY TURNBULL, steward at the annually costs the consumers of the Millicoma Club, has resigned his United States \$13,000,000,000 for the products for which the farmers receive only \$6,000,000,000.
