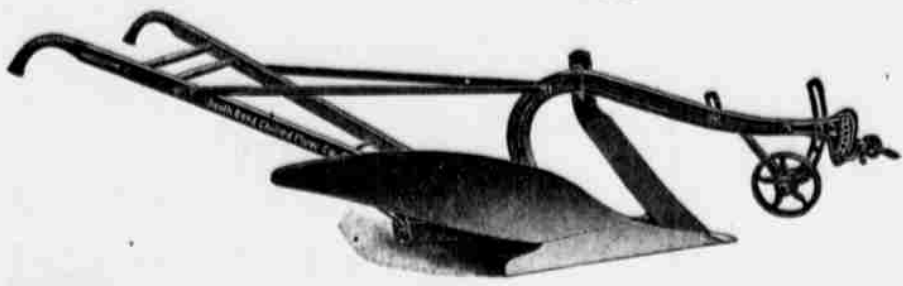

## LOCAL NOTES

**THE WEATHER.**

**Ships Shells.**—Dr. Hayden is now arranging to make a shipment of specimens of Coos Bay shells to the Field Museum at Chicago.

**Others Mentioned.**—Among the possible candidates for mayor of Marshfield mentioned today were C. F. McKnight, Ivy Condon and A. J. Savage.

**On Eastern Trip.**—Coos Bay friends of J. O. Stemmler of Myrtle Point have received cards announcing that he is now at Toledo, O., en route home from an extended eastern trip.

**Builds Houses.**—Several new float houses are being built on North Front street, north of the Perry Transit's landing. Geo W. King is reported as building some of them.

**Named Appraisers.**—Z. T. Johnson, W. E. Lundy and J. D. Barklow have been named appraisers of the assets of Ernest Hermann of Myrtle Point, who recently filed a petition in bankruptcy.

**Change Track.**—It is expected that the removal of the local railway's tracks from the Main street of Coquille to the waterfront there will be completed Saturday and the rails swung over Sunday.

**In Today.**—The Nann Smith arrived in today from Bay Point after a good trip up the coast. Arno Mersen who was expected on her did not arrive, being delayed in Oakland by business matters.

**Meet Friday.**—The Young People's society of the Marshfield Lutheran church will hold a monthly meeting Friday evening at 8 o'clock in the church hall. Plans for the coming season will be made and all members are urged to attend.

**Late Closing.**—It was reported today that a number of Marshfield stores are planning to resume remaining

open evenings thru a few weeks. Whether it will be just for the holidays or for a longer period has not been determined.

**To Close Camp.**—Parties from Allegany today stated that Emmett Pierce has practically completed his logging operations on the Simpson Lumber company's tract near there and is now planning on moving his camp to the Coquille side.

**New Boat.**—Capt C. E. Edwards of the Steamer Alert is figuring on having a stern-wheel boat built for the Allegany-Coos Bay run. She will be of light draught and speedier than the Alert. She will be used in the fast passenger service next summer.

**Pioneers' Picture.**—This morning there was an unusual gathering of Coos Bay pioneers on Front street and they took advantage of the opportunity to have a group picture taken were Judge D. L. Watson of Coos City, R. C. Cordes, Capt. Lightner, L. M. Noble and E. O. Hall.

**Two Realty Deals.**—Carl Johnson and wife of Marshfield are reported to have bought the Joseph Larson ranch below the forks of Coos river and to be planning to move on to it soon. A. J. Carlson was reported today as having bought eighty acres of land near the old government stone quarry on Coos River from Al Smith and W. H. Kennedy.

**Survey Not Done.**—A. G. Raab of North Bend went to Coquille yesterday to confer with the Coos county commissioners about the proposed road connecting Kentuck and the other inlets, including North Coos River. Owing to the county surveyor not having completed the survey of the route, no action can be taken before the next session of the commissioners.

**Rasmussen Star.**—In its writup of last Saturday's game between Oregon Agricultural College and the Chemawa Indian team, a Corvallis paper says that Gordon Rasmussen, son of N. Rasmussen of Marshfield, was easily the star of the last quarter. Although handicapped by his injured hand, the Corvallis paper says Rasmussen played a brilliant game. Corvallis won 75 to 6, Chemawah having scored on a fluke.

**Elks Meet.**—The Marshfield lodge of Elks held an enjoyable meeting last night. J. W. Miller of Coquille was initiated, the new ritual being used for the first time. The initiation ceremony was followed by a Dutch lunch and a Keno contest. It was announced that the special committee had arranged for the Elks' ball to be given at the Eagles Hall, November 29.

**Has Big Crowd.**—The Negro Minstrel performance at the Royal last evening brought out one of the largest crowds that has ever gathered for a show there. All the possible standing room was sold and then over 100 had to be turned away by Manager Lemanski. The troupe is said to be one of the best negro aggregations that has ever visited the Bay. Tonight is their last appearance here, as they go to Coquille valley towns tomorrow.

**Will Give Hearing.**—In response to an inquiry from Coos River, ranchers who are opposed to the closing of the Coos River cut-off, Major Morrow has written here that the closing will not be authorized until a hearing is granted those opposing it. The closing of the cut-off was recommended by Capt. Polhemus. Major Morrow's action is in conformity with that of the port of Coos Bay commission which is considering it. At the next meeting of the port commissioners, November 13, it is expected that the ranchers will be present and present their reasons why the cut-off should not be closed.

**Compliment Coos Bay.**—It will be of interest to many on Coos Bay to know that Rev. H. H. Shires of Bernardsville, N. J., and Miss Mable Clare Mills, whose marriage takes place at the C. J. Mills home in San Francisco today have arranged with Perry & Nicholson of Marshfield for the furniture for their new home. This is probably the largest order for so great a distance that has ever been filled by a Coos Bay furnishing house and it is something for the firm to be proud of as well as other Coos Bay people.
