**Meet Tuesday.**—The local oil company, which is to sink a well on a Catching Inlet for oil, will meet at the Chamber of Commerce at 7:30 tomorrow night to perfect its organization.

**Logger Hurt.**—Parties from the Coquille report that a logger at the Conologue camp was seriously injured by being struck by the limb of a falling tree Friday. He was taken to Bandon.

**Meet Tuesday.**—The Marshfield city council will meet tomorrow night when various matters will be taken up. It is likely that the water franchise matter will come up in some form or other.

## CONTRACTS MAY BE SIGNED

### EUGENE PAPER SAYS SOUTHERN PACIFIC WILL CLOSE CONTRACTS TODAY AND BEGIN WORK AT ONCE.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 6. — The Guard Friday evening printed the following: "There is a reliable report that all contracts for the construction of the Southern Pacific company's Eugene-Coos Bay railroad will be signed next Monday and that the work will begin immediately after that time. This report came from a firm which expects to be awarded a sub-contract. A member of the firm was here one day this week and went out over the line for a distance of twenty miles or so to inspect the right-of-way. He told a well-known citizen of this city that the company would sign up with the successful bidders on the road on Monday and that on Tuesday the first actual construction work on the line would be started. This firm is after a contract to clear the right-of-way, and it is probable that work of this nature will be the first to start, although it is possible to begin grading immediately, as all the right-of-way out of Eugene as far as the Asset company's pass five miles west of the city has been obtained and a continuous stretch for many miles west of that point has been needed to the company.

Whether or not this contracting firm's tip is straight remains to be seen, but it is known that the company intends to begin work in a very short time and if not on Monday of next week, it is confidently expected to be within two weeks at the latest.

### More Right-of-Way.

In securing right-of-way through the McClaren tract bordering on Blair street in the northwestern part of the city, J. L. Buell, the company's right-of-way agent, closed up a gap of half a mile or more that it was thought there would be considerable difficulty over, but everything was amicably settled and the company paid the price asked for by Mrs. Annie McClaren and husband, the owners of the land. It is said that the price paid for the right-of-way was \$2,500.

Mr. Buell expected to close a deal with J. C. Jensen for right-of-way between the main line and Blair street. The tract is small and lies on the east side of Blair street and borders on the Sladden addition. The new branch will divert from the main line on this tract.

### Stations Every 4 1/2 Miles.

It is learned the company's intention is to establish stations every four and a half miles out of Eugene. In this case the first one will be a mile and a half this side of the Asset company's gap, the second one near Coyote creek, the third one opposite Elmira, (the road will run three-fourths of a mile south of the town,) the fourth one near the junction of the main stage road and the Noti road, the fifth one just beyond the summit of the mountains and so on. At each of these stations it is expected that quite a little village will spring up and in some instances they might develop into bustling towns and cities.

## IS VICTIM OF ODD ACCIDENT

### Wm. Reichert of North Bend Scalded by Kettle Upsetting

#### —Other Accidents.

Wm. Reichert was the victim of a rather unusual accident at his home in North Bend last evening. He was sitting with his feet on the stove when his wife while putting wood in the stove upset a pot of boiling hot water in which some potatoes were cooking. In such a way that both of Mr. Reichert's feet were badly scalded. A physician was called and dressed the injured members but Mr. Reichert will be laid up for some time.

Postmaster Russell was slightly injured this morning while trying to start a fire in the furnace. The gas caused the flames to flare out in his face, blistering and singeing him considerably. Harry Winkler came to his aid and promptly dressing the wounds reduced the pain.

J. D. Rice, who resides on Daniels Creek was in Marshfield today securing medical treatment for injuries sustained in an accident Saturday. He fell about twelve feet out of an apple tree, striking on his head and shoulders, breaking a rib and severely bruising himself.
