

# BANDON MAN IS UNDER ARREST

### K. I. Wheeler, Grocer, Taken to Jackson County, Ore., on Murder Charge.

Deputy Sheriff Eaton of Jackson county left Coquille yesterday with K. I. Wheeler, who engaged in the grocery business at Bandon about four months past, for Jacksonville where Wheeler is charged with the murder of a hide dealer about five or six months ago. The evidence against Wheeler is said to be circumstantial. The crime was not discovered until a short time ago when the missing man's body was found. Robbery is supposed to have been the motive for the crime.

Sheriff Gage who came over from Coquille today, was not able to learn the full details of the crime. A few weeks ago, he and the Bandon marshal located Wheeler in response to a request from the officials of Jackson county, Oregon, and sent for an officer from there to come and get him. Wheeler was not arrested at the time but left free until Deputy Sheriff Eaton arrived.

Wheeler during his residence in Bandon has been considered a very upright citizen and his arrest caused much surprise there. He is a comparatively young man and is married. He denies his guilt.

#### Calf Stealing Case.

Sheriff Gage and Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Liljeqvist will go to Bandon in a day or so to investigate an alleged calf stealing case there. C. H. Chandler, a rancher living near Bandon, walked into a meat market there the other day and found hanging on the wall what he alleges to be the carcass of a calf that disappeared from his ranch. The head could not be found. Chandler alleges the calf was stolen from him, and arrests may follow.

#### MYRTLE POINT PORT.

### Alleged Defect in Petition From There For Formation.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "L. A. Robinson of Myrtle Point filed with the county clerk a petition to establish a port commission at Myrtle Point signed by 133 names. Wednesday the petition was presented to the county court to pass upon. The petition calls for about three quarters of the watershed of the Coquille river to be taxed for this port commission. The port will include about five or six miles of river, the lower limit being about a mile above Coquille.

"When the county court referred the petition to the district attorney to pass upon its legality he found several flaws in it. The law requires that the signers give their postoffice and residence addresses. It was found that thirty-three had not given their addresses. On account of there being two chief justices elected at the last election it was found that there was no method of ascertaining the legal number of voters in the district. The method heretofore has been to find how many were qualified to vote for chief justice and in this way the number of qualified voters was found. It is probable that this matter will have to be referred to the higher courts."

# RIGHT-OF-WAY NEARLY DONE

### Negotiations For Nearly All Between Umpqua and Coos Bay Closed.

Announcement is made that the Southern Pacific has closed negotiations for practically all of the right-of-way for the Coos Bay-Eugene line between Gardiner and Coos Bay. There are a few small pieces on which the negotiations have not been closed but it is expected to close them within a few days. It is probable that the entire stretch of right-of-way will be secured without condemnation proceedings although the latter may be resorted to in one or two tracts where the owners are holding back for what the company considers an exorbitant price.

Within a few days, right-of-way men will start in work between Gardiner and Florence to close up negotiations with the owners of the smaller tracts crossed. It is understood that arrangements have already been made with the holders of the large tracts so that only the minor details remain to be worked out.

In view of this, announcement of the awarding of the contract for a section of the line at this end, possibly from Sand Point, at the mouth of North Inlet, to the Umpqua, is likely to be made in the near future.

#### EUGENE MAN'S VIEW.

The Eugene Register says: "F. P. Hunt is home from a business trip to Marshfield and Coos Bay points by boat. He says the people there are greatly excited over railroads and are in as deep a quandary over who or what is behind the Pacific Great Western as the people of Eugene are. He says they have got property very high in Marshfield, away above what good business property can be for in Eugene and this city continues to look very good to him."

#### CONTRACT TO BE LET

### Chief Engineer Hood Checks Up Bids on Work.

The Eugene Register says: "The Register is assured that contract for construction of the first 24 miles of the Southern Pacific's new line to the coast out of Eugene will be let within a very short time, probably within ten days or two weeks. There are several contractors who have gone over the line and it takes some time for estimates to be made by the builders before putting in the bids. Chief Engineer Hood has to go over the bids carefully and the time necessary in which to do this will cover a week or two at least."

#### HAWLEY FOR PORT.

### Tells Coquille Valley People They Must Organize.

The Coquille Sentinel in telling of Congressman Hawley's recent visit there quotes him as follows on further improvements of navigation there: "In regard to the improvement on your river that is a question which has often been put before me. I believe that the best way would be to organize a port commission and show your good faith in this matter. Of course no appropriation would be considered if the project is not recommended by the engineers. The way to start the thing is to get together and organize the port commission and then do all that is possible yourself to improve the river. In time you will probably get an appropriation from the government for extensive improvements. I promise my aid in all efforts that you make for the improvement of your harbors as I believe that all improvements of this character are an asset to the whole country."

#### HAWLEY IS HOME.

### Congressman Pleased With Trip Through This Section.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 7.—Tired and weary from about ten days spent on train, stage and boat investigating the waterways in Douglas and Coos counties, Congressman W. C. Hawley returned home on the early train this morning. The trip was a hard one because of the lack of transportation facilities, but Mr. Hawley expressed himself as highly pleased with the uniform enthusiasm of the citizens of the localities visited and the general appearance of prosperity and development wherever he went. With the prospect of rail communication assuming more tangible shape, the development already accomplished by the expenditure of large sums of money in the improvement of the waterways, and the belief that the government will continue to appropriate money for the improvement of the Coos Bay, Coquille and Umpqua waterways, the people of western Douglas and Coos county are now fully confident that their great resources of the soil, mine, forest and sea will soon find an accessible route to profitable outside markets, says Mr. Hawley.

Refreshments were served by the ladies of the church. The meeting was an enthusiastic and pleasant one throughout, and indicative of cooperation.
