"MAN IS far from being master of his environment and he soon finds at such critical times that he is himself a product, a phenomenon, and not the director of his own destiny except within very narrow limits. A bad spell of weather or a period of overstrain will find out your weak spot; and like a chain, you are only as strong as your weakest link. They have found old Pharaoh's mummy in Egypt and the diseased condition of his jaw shows that he must have suffered terribly from ulcerated teeth. Perhaps it was the physical torture of neuralgia that hardened his heart against the Children of Israel and brought down the plagues from Heaven. Was it the battle of Waterloo that was lost because Napoleon had the toothache? When you find you have struck one of these rough spots in your life, let up on yourself a little if you possibly can, relax a little. Nothing is truer than that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure—that a stitch in time saves nine. A recent eastern railroad accident was due to the engineer's mistaken judgment in sending his train at 60-mile speed over a section of track that was designed for only half that. Almost all these frightful auto accidents that are taking place are the natural result of taking reckless risks; an auto sanely driven need be no menace either to occupants or others. When in doubt, don't."

of the cheap water transportation. Quantities of fruit in this country are allowed to rot on the trees or ground because the cost of getting to market would take off all the profit. Here is a problem that will have to be solved, but we must remember that even with the best methods the cost of transporting products from the point where they are produced to the door of the consumer will always be a large item, for at best they must pass through many hands.

Speaking of government on the commission plan: I would be very glad to take the job of governing the country for a commission of only one per cent, say, on all the money spent.

The cost of battleships has gone down anyway. The Oregon, 20 years ago, cost \$640 a ton, while the new Delaware cost only \$388. But even at the reduced price I personally will not be able to buy many battleships, nor do I feel that I could make much use of any. If the price of bacon and potatoes, for instance, would go down, that would really help some.

Up in Toronto, Canada, a man from Michigan has just been given a life sentence for criminal negligence in operating an automobile. According to evidence he ran into a crowd of people, injuring four or five, while intoxicated. They have a way of handing out justice in the dominion that is productive of the right kind of results. There is no more excuse for a reckless, incompetent or intoxicated man to kill or maim his fellow man with an automobile than there is for him to accomplish the same homicide with a gun.

The man who is "too busy" to lend a little help in the community's common cause is too busy to measure high in the community stature, remarks an exchange. The man who is so poor he "can't afford" to support a well-founded, successful, result-producing community movement, is indeed so poor that he is on the debit side of the community ledger. The man who counts for something in the community is the man who does something for the community. And he is the same man who gets back from the community the fullest measure of return.

BLAMES THE COFFEE TRUST

Grocer Blames Arbuckle Monopoly For High Price Now.

When a prominent grocer was interviewed as to the reasons for the continued rise in the price of coffee, he replied by saying that it all hinged on the doings of the Arbuckle company, which seems to be in reality the coffee trust.

"Some time ago the Arbuckle people made it possible for the Brazilian government to borrow about \$75,000,000. In return for this favor the Arbuckle interests secured concessions that put them in control of the entire output of coffee from that country. As the output of coffee from Brazil constitutes about four-fifths of the crop of the world, one can readily see just what this means to the markets of the world. The price of all coffee has been steadily advancing until it is now nearly twice what it was a year ago in the cheaper grades. The higher grades have not been advanced as much in proportion as the cheaper varieties, but all have gone ahead and if any one may judge from the indications, the prices have not reached the top.
"The lowest grade of coffee that is sold by any of the jobbers or roasters is now 22 1/2 cents per pound. The same coffee was sold a year ago for 11 cents."

SLEEP A POISONING.

French Observer Considers Slumber the Result of a Toxin.

The curious conclusion of the French observers, MM. Legendre and Pieron, that sleep is due to a sort of poisoning of the brain, has, according to a scientific contemporary, been much discussed. It is, the French experimenters contend, produced by a morbid change in certain cells of the frontal lobe of the brain. And this poison is held to act as an anti-toxin, and to neutralize in the higher nerve centers the poisons produced by the fatigues of the day. The poison of sleep, in fact, is believed to be an antidote for all the poisonous by-products produced in the human body by every mental and physical action.

The experiment which is described as having led to the above extraordinary theory was as follows: Serum from the brain of a dog, which had died of insomnia, was injected into another dog. It fell into a deep sleep, from which it awoke in a perfectly healthy state. The inference that sleep is due to a natural poison in the brain, however, scarcely seems to follow as a logical conclusion. For the brain of the dog which died of insomnia could scarcely be supposed to contain this poison. It is suggested that such experiments should lead to the invention of a cure for insomnia. There is also the suggestion of the possibility of a cure for sleep which seems of more importance. If the poisonous by-products of fatigue and the toxin of sleep could both be neutralized by suitable injections, then a man might do without sleep.
