### SIZE OF BUTTER SQUARES.

J. W. Bailey, Oregon state dairy and food commissioner, has issued an order stating that he will enforce the law, which requires that every square of butter kept or expressed, or offered for sale in the state, shall contain not less than 8 ounces, 16 ounces, or 32 ounces, and each square or roll shall be plainly marked with the number of ounces they contain. This applies to all butter, both country and creamery, whether the same be made inside or outside the state. Better mark and weigh your butter and avoid any possible danger of trouble.
