PLAY SATURDAY AT NORTH BEND

Coos County High School Football Championship Will Be Decided Then.

The football championship of Coos county for 1911 will be decided next Saturday when the Marshfield and North Bend high school teams meet in North Bend in the last game of the season. Marshfield has the championship virtually clinched, as Myrtle Point defeated North Bend last Saturday and Marshfield has already defeated both teams. However, the unexpected is always liable to happen, and the Marshfield boys will not rest easy until the game is safely stowed away.

Marshfield has been greatly handicapped the past week, for lack of a good place to practice. The grounds resemble a cuck pond more than a football gridiron, and have been so soft that fast play is almost impossible. One of the boys even went so far as to volunteer to set out decoys the night before the game and get more ducks than Marshfield got points in the contest. However, the soft state of the field may work out in Marshfield's favor in the end, for the sudden change from a soft field to the firm turf at North Bend, is liable to result in some very speedy play.

This is the last chance that Marshfield people will have to see the team in action and everybody is urged to come out and support the home team. A big bunch of rooters from the school are planning to accompany the boys and promise to make up in noise what the team may lack in weight. The Alice H has been chartered and will leave the Market street dock at 1:30 o'clock, returning after the game. Fare round trip 25c.

The exact lineup has not been decided, but will appear at a later date.

LET CONTRACT FOR STEAMER

Capt. Edwards & Son to Build Fine Boat For Allegany Run.

C. E. Edwards & Son have just closed a contract with F. Lowe and W. W. Coland for a fine new stern wheel steamer for the Allegany passenger and auto route trade. She is to be of the following dimensions: 64-foot hull, 15-foot beam; 42 feet in depth. The hull is designed by Frank Lowe who designed and built the Millcoma. Capt. Edwards last boat. The new boat will be equipped with electric lights and high pressure and Seabury steam boilers, the engines to be built by Fred. Nelson, which will give the new steamer approximately 100-horse power which should make her the fastest inside steamer on Coos Bay.

She is to be completed next February and will go on a double run about May 1, between here and Allegany, carrying passengers for the Cornwall, Edwards and Foot autos on the Allegany-Drain run.

The people of North Coos River are to be congratulated on getting this valuable addition to the steamer fleet which will be used principally on excursion work and heavy freighting.

AN EDUCATIONAL PROBLEM.

OF THE one thousand children who start to school in American cities, nine hundred and fifty-four drop out before finishing high school. Seven-eighths of the American children never enter high school at all. These statistics, given by William Allen White, in an article entitled "A Democratic View of Education," should direct attention to the fact that the urgent problem in education is one which concerns the masses as well as the small percentage of your people who go through the high school and the still smaller number who finish the college courses.

We may justly feel that the college and university, marking the culmination of educational effort, should command particular attention and direction. In a measure it is true that the colleges are supplying leaders or are attempting to supply them. But a leader is rather helpless without an intelligent following, especially a leader who seeks to work by legitimate methods and to avoid the deceptive, hoodwinking schemes which have been perpetrated by unprincipled demagogues since the beginning of time.

Besides, when a person reaches the stage of the college education, he should be able in a large measure to choose for himself, to explore the realms of knowledge unaided and to avoid the pitfalls that are before the boy or girl with only the faint and ineffectual enlightenment of the grades. The college student, especially in the last two years of his course, should be able to extract from teachers and libraries in a largely independent manner, the particular training that he desires. He may do this if he is capable of the highest education and has been efficiently prepared by his earlier schooling.

So the burden of our educational weakness falls heaviest in relation to the seven-eighths who never get into the high school and to the nine hundred and fifty-four who drop out of the high school without finishing. The tendency of modern social evolution is not primarily to develop isolated supermen, but to move the whole mass of humanity a step at a time toward the goal which the isolated superman has attained or dreamed of.

Educational emphasis should be in this same direction. And until we have made the school mean something vital and attractive, something compellingly necessary for the millions who are dropping out before they have fairly started on the ladder of learning, we should spend less time worrying over the hundreds who have climbed to the top and are in a fair way to look out for themselves.

The great weakness of our present system of education is that it does not educate, does not get within speaking distance of the majority of those it is aiming to prepare for good citizenship.
