**NEW LOGGING CAMPS.**

Camp No. 1 of Smith-Powers Logging company has just started operations near head of navigation of South Coos River. The camp is in charge of Mr. Bert Cleaton, foreman, about 60 men now being employed there. The logs are brought down to the river on a 2,600 foot long incline railway, one car being operated with a monstrous Willamette engine and cable. There is somewhere in the neighborhood of twenty million feet to be taken out of the camp, so it is being established with a view toward remaining for some time.

The camp has been built under supervision of foreman W. A. Varney, who has been in charge of road construction and the like at the site since last May. He is now directing the work of construction for another new camp soon to be established a short distance to the east of camp No. 1. A roadway similar to the one used by Camp No. 1 is being constructed up through another canyon, and will soon be ready.

**COOS COUNTY STRAWBERRIES.**
