LOCAL NOTES

THE WEATHER.

Breakwater Sails Early.—The Breakwater will sail at eight o'clock tomorrow morning for Portland. It was erroneously announced yesterday that the Breakwater would sail at nine o'clock.

Heavy Rains.—The rainfall the past two days has been greater than was supposed. In the twenty-four hours ending at 5 o'clock yesterday, the total precipitation was 1.03 inches. All the streams are showing the effects of the heavy rains but it will require much more precipitation before there will be any particular danger from freshets.

Richardson's Bill.—Engineer Richardson of Portland, who was engaged by the North Bend and Marshfield city councils to investigate the water situation, has sent in his bill. He asks \$639.75 for his work and the North Bend city council has agreed to pay two-fifths or \$245.90 of the sum. The Marshfield city council will act on the bill at the next meeting.

Try Case Soon.—It is expected that the case of Christian Herinann who disposed of the former Chandler ranch last summer, against John F. Hall, Henry Sengstacken, L. D. Smith and a number of others, will come up for trial in the federal court at Portland soon. Hermann married the widow of the late John Norman of Marshfield in 1904 at the time of her death inherited much property on Coos Bay. He alleges that the property was sold by his Coos Bay representatives for much less than its value. He is a German, having married Mrs. Norman in Germany and resided there with her until her death. He married again. He and his present wife are now residents of Portland.

Case Over Stallion.—A suit to be tried at the coming term of circuit court at Coquille in December is attracting some attention here now. It grows out of the trouble last spring over the refusal of local parties to take a stallion which was shipped here by Ruby and company of Portland on an alleged contract, the Coos county men alleging that the animal was not as high grade an animal as they contracted for. Ruby and company have sold the contract or notes of the local parties to Leiter & Campbell of Portland who are suing the local men who are made defendants are W. F. Bowron, William Beattie, Allan Roberts, Paul Robaugh, Geo. Divilblus, Blanchard Brothers and Roy Rezin. Last summer when the representative of Ruby and company was here and tried to enforce payment of the notes, a hand to hand conflict nearly ensued.

Postmaster Russell announces that the deposits in the Postal Savings Department which was started here a couple of weeks ago now total about \$800.

Jas. Allen, manager of the shingle mill announces that the reconstruction of the plant has been completed and the mill will be started just as soon as the market will enable him to dispose of the output and the shingles he has on hand.

Harry Walker and Vic. Lindstrom while hunting near Cooston the other day nearly had a bad accident. They had separated and Walker seeing some object stirring the brush took a shot at it. The object proved to be Lindstrom and the bullet had passed through the crown of his hat.

The North Bend council has decided to hold up the bill of the Coos Bay Water company for \$126 for installing fire hydrants until a new contract for water is made. The council alleges that the company is now charging \$3.50 per month rental for each hydrant, which they claim is too much. The council also decided to purchase some more fire hose to be kept at Porter, the people there having agreed to purchase a hose cart if the city would supply the hose.

At a meeting in the office of Dr. Bartle the other evening, candidates for the various North Bend city offices to be filled at the coming election were discussed. Among those mentioned for councilmen were L. F. Falkenstein, C. H. Brouillard, Geo. D. Mandigo, M. E. Everitt, W. H. Chappell, and J. F. Grubbs. A. H. Derbyshire will be a candidate for reelection as recorder, and C. S. Winsor for treasurer. Peter Loggie, Sever Backey and August Hoelling may also get into the race.
