Redondo Sails Sunday.—The Redondo will sail at 9 o'clock Sunday morning for San Francisco.

Big Beets.—L. A. Haglund of Marshfield today placed on exhibit at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce some of the finest beets seen here in a long time.

Wed In Los Angeles.—Friends here have received word that Miss Faye Bridges, formerly of Marshfield but now of Los Angeles, will soon be married there to a Nevada man.

New candidates.—F. E. Allen of South Marshfield was one of the probable new candidates for councilman talked about today. W. W. Holland, it was also reported, would probably enter the race.

Close Plant.—The old electric light plant in West Marshfield which has been in operation for a few weeks while the electrical donkey engine was being tested for the Smith-Powers logging company, will shut down today. The test of the electrical donkeys will be continued later on a greater scale. So far, it has proved a great success.

In Civil Service.—J. B. Sneddon, who took the Civil Service examination yesterday, for appointment as mail carrier in Marshfield, is a former civil service man. The other two who took it are also former government employes, Will Elckworth having served in the Spanish-American War and F. O. Brooks having served in the Civil service.

Fight Thanksgiving.—John Herron is in receipt of a telegram from Danny O'Brien of Portland saying that O'Brien is willing to meet Earl Henderson here in a twenty round go Thanksgiving. Mr. Herron will see O'Brien in Portland next week and will probably bring him down for the bout. O'Brien says his hand is in good shape again. He had to call off his first proposed match with Henderson on account of an injury to it.

Ten Mile Salmon.—The run of salmon in Ten Mile lakes is larger this season than for many years past. Walter Condon has put on a four horse team to bring the big catches to the Coos Bay canneries.

Big Fish Business.—The Coquille Cooperative Fish Cannery Association report that the present year has been one of the most successful in the history of the association. Already they have caught and packed 12,000 cases of salmon, most of them being shipped to San Francisco.

Meet Wednesday.—The adjourned meeting of the oil company being organized to sink an oil well on Catching Inlet, will be held at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce next Wednesday evening when it is expected that organization will be perfected. Mr. Maubin stated that at noon today, \$17,375 worth of stock had been subscribed and he hoped the balance of the \$20,000 desired would be forthcoming before Wednesday. WELL ON BEAR CREEK GUSHES

GREAT GAS PRESSURE RESULTS IN SPOUTING MUD AND GRAVEL AND WATER WITH TRACES OF OIL.

BANDON, Ore., Nov. 18. — Geo. Topping, who has just returned from a visit to the Bear Creek oil well, reports an enormous gas pressure in it. The well is now down about 1,700 feet and at intervals is spouting mud, gravel and sand with traces of oil to a height of eight feet. The well is kept full of water to keep down the gas pressure and enable the drillers to work. Oil men here say these are indications that a gusher will be struck soon and all connected with it are highly elated.
