Appeal Case.—A. M. Ross is appealing the case of B. F. Rahskopf against him. In the trial of the case before Justice Pennoek, Rahskopf was given a verdict for about \$87.50 by the jury.

Ship Apples.—The Homer is scheduled to sail from San Francisco today for Coos Bay. On her next trip out, she will take two carloads of evaporated apples from F. S. Dow's plant at Myrtle Point. The apples have been sold for shipment to Europe. The Homer will also take out two carloads of canned beans from the Myrtle Point cannery.

Geo. Deubner Better.—Wm. Deubner received a telegram last evening from San Francisco stating that their son, George, who has been ill of typhoid fever at the hospital there, was somewhat improved. Earlier in the day, he received a telegram from Mrs. George Deubner that his condition was about the same. That he will quickly recover is the ardent wish of his many friends on the bay.

Council Tonight.—The Marshfield city council will meet tonight to take up various matters. Among the things to come up will be the report of the special committee appointed to negotiate to secure the Clear Lake water supply for the city and also the report of City Attorney

Goss on what steps can be taken to force the water company to furnish better water and an adequate pressure for fire protection.

Breaks Ribs.—A. L. Foster of South Marshfield is suffering from some fractured ribs sustained from a fall the other day while at work. He was straining on a wrench when he slipped and fell with terrific force.

Delay Hearing.—The first meeting of creditors in the voluntary bankruptcy case of S. J. Immel of North Bend tomorrow will be adjourned for a few days at the request of some of the creditors. The creditors are to choose a trustee.

Not New in Coos.—Cal. Wright, former deputy state game warden, was much interested in the story in The Times last night that the State of Oregon was finally going to raise the bounty on varmints that are doing so much towards eliminating deer and elk. Mr. Wright a few years ago circulated a petition to the Coos county commissioners asking that they pay a royalty besides the state bounty and they granted the petition with the result that the varmints have been pretty well eliminated from this county.

Bay Park Man Dead.—Geo. W. Hanson of Bay Park died last night at Mercy Hospital. Several weeks ago he fell off an elevated walk leading to his home and sustained injuries which resulted in partial paralysis and he had been hovering between life and death ever since. He was about fifty years old and is survived by a wife and step-daughter. He was employed for several years as fireman at the Smith mill. The funeral arrangements have not been completed yet but will probably be held from the Dungan Undertaking Parlors.

Is Released.—W. S. Erie, who was arrested here a few days ago by Constable Cox on request from Jackson officers, was released from the city jail by Mr. Cox. The Jackson county officials were notified two or three times of Erie's arrest here, but did not answer, although they had given specific instructions to hold him until an officer from there arrived to take him in charge. Mr. Cox thought it was an injustice to hold Erie longer in view of the strange action of the Jackson county officers. The charge against Jackson was said to be jumping a board bill. He denied his guilt of this offense.

McNAMARA CAST CLASH

Bitterly Contested Points In Trial Is Revived Today.
(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 21.—One of the most bitterly contested points in the McNamara trial was reopened today when Darrow protested against the option held by the state of challenging taxsmen opposed to conviction on circumstantial evidence or not as the state's counsel sees fit. The privilege of challenge on this ground long ago was refused the defense. Today, when Talesman M. P. Mooney, an Irish Catholic and a member of a labor organization, was challenged on this ground, Darrow protested, but the court allowed the challenge. A moment later Talesman L. W. Traver, asked by the court if he was opposed to the infliction of the death penalty, said he was in cases involving circumstantial evidence.

"The statute and decisions are that a man with such beliefs shall not be allowed to serve and that the court shall not permit him to serve." The court said he would look up Darrow's authorities. Traver remains in the box until the point is determined.
