#### KILLED NEAR EMPIRE.

St. Louis Insurance Case Hinges on Mysterious Crime on Coos Bay.

According to ne from St. Louis, a mysterious murder was committed somewhere near Coos Bay in 1898. Geo. A. Kimmel, a banker at Arkansas City, Ark., dropped out of sight at the Midland hotel at Kansas City, July 28, 1898, and has never been located. His relatives attempted to collect his life insurance from the New York Life Insurance company but the company refused to pay and the suit will come up next month. It is now claimed that John B. Swinney of Mineson, N. M., alleges he killed a man named daughter, Mrs. Smith, will leave Johnson whom he saw slay Kimmel near Coos Bay. Swinney claims that he, Kimmel, R. M.
