**KILLED NEAR EMPIRE.**  
**St. Louis Insurance Case Hinges on Mysterious Crime on Coos Bay.**  
According to newspaper clippings from St. Louis, a mysterious murder was committed somewhere near Coos Bay in 1898. Geo. A. Kimmel, a banker at Arkansas City, Ark., dropped out of sight at the Midland hotel at Kansas City, July 28, 1898, and has never been located. His relatives attempted to collect his life insurance from the New York Life Insurance company but the company refused to pay and the suit will come up next month. It is now claimed that John B. Swinney of Mineson, N. M., alleges he killed a man named Johnson whom he saw slay Kimmel near Coos Bay. Swinney claims that he, Kimmel, R. M. Snyder and a man named Johnson came to Coos Bay to search for a \$400,000 buried treasure near here which Johnson knew about. They came via San Francisco to Empire and then took a launch across the bay. Instead of \$400,000, Swinney claims they only got \$4,000 and in a row that followed, Johnson killed Kimmel and he shot Johnson, fearing attack on himself, and then Snyder buried the two. Swinney says Snyder died afterwards so that he is the only survivor. Frederick H. Bacon, a St. Louis attorney, is looking into the case.

It is all news to Coos Bay people and not much confidence is placed in the story here.
