'Liberal appropriations are considered proper and destrable for snagging and other work necessary to make natural channels available wherever water-borne commerce exists or is reasonably prospective. It eral public, especially since the introduction and rapid development of small gasoline motorboats for combined freight and passenger transportation. In many cases, it is apparent that the failure to use a waterway is due not so much to lack of channel depth as to the presence of snags and other obstructions which can be removed at comparatively small cost, thus making the natural channel depths fully available throughout the year.
