Ship Cheese—C. E. Broadbent of Myrtle Point on the next Homer will ship one thousand cases of Coos county cheese to the San Francisco market.

To Close Earlier—Deputy Postmaster Sumner announced today that beginning December 1, the Marshfield postoffice will close at 7 o'clock instead of 7:30 as heretofore.

Open Headquarters—The I. W. W. have opened headquarters in the old bakery building on Market avenue near Third street and are planning to establish a permanent branch here.

Meet Tonight—The Norwegian Lutheran church Young People's Society will meet at the church hall this evening. The entertainment will be in charge of Mr. Andrewson and Miss Mable Mathison.

Is Better—Mrs. H. H. McPherson of Marshfield, who is spending the winter in Los Angeles, is just recovering from a rather severe sick spell, according to word received by friends here.

Big Cabbage—Tom Coke is now vying with Ivy Condon for honors as the Coos county cabbage king. The other day, he brought up one head of cabbage out of his garden that weighed fifteen pounds and three ounces.

To Enter Hospital—Mrs. Myrtle Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Abbott will enter Lane hospital at San Francisco in a few days to undergo an operation. She was accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Abbott.

Eggs Higher—Very few fresh eggs are obtainable on the local market now, Coos county hens apparently having gone on a strike. Mostly cold storage eggs are now being sold. Strictly fresh eggs are said to be selling readily at from sixty to seventy-five cents per dozen.

Will Give Ball—The Marshfield High School Athletic association has arranged to give a ball at the Eagles hall on the evening of December 27. It will be strictly an invitational affair and promises to be one of the principal social events of the holiday season.

To Relay Paving—Manager Morrissey of the Coos Bay Paving and Construction company is assembling his equipment to relay the paving on Hall avenue which the property owners and city council found defective. If the weather is good, it can be accomplished in a few days.

Change Vessel's Name—The new steamer which the Simpson Lumber company is having built at the North Bend shipyards, will be called the A. M. Simpson after all. It was first proposed to name her but Capt. Simpson objected and it was then decided to call her the Astoria. However, yesterday orders were given to cut out the name Astoria which had been carved on her and

have "A. M. Simpson" substituted. The new vessel will probably be launched December 3.

DAVE SNEEDON PASSES AWAY

Well-Known Libby Young Man Succumbs to Long Illness in Marshfield.

Dave Sneddon, a well-known Libby young man, died today noon at the home of his sister, Mrs. Chas. Lapp, in Marshfield after a lingering illness. He was first stricken with an attack of peritonitis and recovered from it only to suffer from other complications which resulted in his death. Mr. Sneddon was only about thirty-six years old and had spent practically his entire life in this vicinity. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Sneddon, who are pioneers of this section. He is a nephew of Chas. Sneddon. A sister, Mrs. Chas. Lapp, lives in Marshfield, another sister, Mrs. Tom Wilson, lives at Libby and a brother, Robert Sneddon, lives at Coalinga, Calif.

The funeral will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Chas. Lapp residence, the Rev. J. T. M. Knox officiating.

Mrs. Frederick Weyerhaeuser Passes Away at St. Paul After Long Illness.
