**Hears Case.**—The Port Orford Port Commission injunction case is being argued before Judge John S. Coke today. Attorneys Meredith and Peck representing the Curry county people favoring the port, and Attorneys Upton and Goss representing the Langlois people opposing it. The point in controversy is whether Port Orford is really a bad or harbor within the meaning of the state law providing for the organization of Port Commissions. The opponents to the port commission claim it is merely an open roadstead of the high seas.

## HARVARD RENT BY SUFFRAGE

Students of Great University In Turmoil Over Bartering Out of Suffrage

**CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 1.**—The refusal of the Harvard Corporation to permit Mrs. Pankhurst to address the students in the college building, has caused a stir in undergraduate circles. The body of students is splitting into two camps suffragettes and "antis" and the influential alumni are being asked to take a hand in the controversy and petition the corporation to reverse its judgment and the "pro-Pankhurst" party is enrolling itself under the banner of an organization known as the Harvard Men's Equal Suffrage league of which William T. Fisher, a junior of Chicago, is president.

### BANDON MAN DEAD.

Will Barrows, who went to San Francisco about two weeks ago to receive medical treatment, passed away in that city Sunday night. Mr. Barrows was well known here, having lived in Bandon with his mother for some time. He was 41 years old and unmarried.—Bandon Recorder.
