A cablegram from the British foreign minister, Sir Edward Grey, was presented to the assembly urging compliance with the Russian demands, but some of the members pointed out that England's advice heretofore had only led to Persian humiliation. They believed Sir Edward had been misinformed, and emphatically asserted that Russia's injustice was intolerable. They thought that resistance on the part of the Persian government to the Russian demands would awaken foreign attention and lead to an impartial inquiry. Compliance on the other hand will be construed as a sign of abject cowardice and mean national suicide.

TO PROTECT SON.

Father of American Official of Persia Makes Appeal.

Moissant's Heirs Cling to Flying Machine Prize

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—The award of the ten thousand dollar statue of Liberty prize a few days ago to Claude Grahame White will be contested by the relatives of the late John B. Moissant. Grahame White who was second, protested on a technicality. The International Aeronautic Federation sustained the protest. Moissant's relatives now threaten to carry the case to the courts. It is not impossible that the actual transfer of money will be tied up for years by litigation.

It is understood that McMahon's counsel will waive the appeal for a new trial in order to immediately take up the case to the board of pardons.

CHINA SCENE OF DISORDERS

HONG KONG, China, Dec. 1.—Although the reign of piracy on West river has been checked by the vigilance of guards on board the river steamers, the situation ashore is utterly chaotic. In towns and settlements along the river, the most deplorable outrages have frequently occurred. Even in Canton, the military regime is wholly inefficient and armed bands of robbers and hoodlums go about the city looting shops and houses, and one bank was relieved of five thousand dollars by five armed men. Street fighting is continuous in all parts of Canton and those killed or injured include many innocent by-standers.

ORDERED TO CHINA.

U. S. Man of War Reported en Route to Shanghai.
